TO BE REMEMBERED.

HERE is a record of the expenditures on ordinary or consolidated account, since 1896 (the last year of Conservative rule) the year in each case ending with June 30:

1896	\$36,949,142
1897	38,349,760
1898	38,832,526
1899	41,760,342
1900	42,987,549

There has been, in the four years since the Laurier Government came into power, an increase in the expenses of the administration of six millions a year.

The outlays on capital account have been in proportion. Here are the figures:

1896	\$3,781,311
1897	3,523,160
1898	4,142,231
1899	9,639,142
1900	9,726,260

There has been an increase in his department of the expenditure in the last year of the Liberal, as compared with the last year of the Conservative Government, of close upon six millions a year.

Fourteen millions more were collected from the people in 1900 than in 1896. Here are the figures, taken from the public accounts, and Mr. Fielding's address at Halifax:

1900	50,927,941

Most of the increase came out of taxation, as is shown by the figures of the customs and inland revenue collections.

This means that the rate of taxation has increased under the Laurier Government from \$5.42 to \$7.51 a head, or from \$27.10 to \$37.67 a family.

"I wish to maintain the present order of things only so long as Canada is not strong enough to become a nation."—Israel Tarte at Laval, from report in La Patrie.

The political meeting at Milltown Cross was well attended. The meeting was addressed by the candidates, Messrs. McKinnon and Martin, Mr. Wheatley, of Charlottetown, and Mr. Murdoch McKinnon. The Conservative speakers made an excellent impression, and Milltown Cross may be depended upon to give a good account of itself on election day. We regret that we have not space today for the extended report of the meeting that has been kindly forwarded us.

To vote for the Ex-Archbishop General is to vote disregard for the British constitution, as well as endorsement of all the acts of the Tarte-Laurier government.

NEW BRITISH CABINET.

Sir Matthew White Ridley's Retirement.—Brodrick for War Office.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The reorganization of the Cabinet, which is officially announced, is received with mixed comment, both within and without the Unionist party. The retirement of Sir Matthew White Ridley from the office of Secretary for Home Affairs, came as a genuine surprise, although it was known that he accepted office in the recent government reluctantly.

Lord Salisbury adds the office of Lord Privy Seal to the Premiership, which he retains, because it carries a salary, while the Premiership alone is unpaid.

Lord Lansdowne's promotion to be Minister of Foreign Affairs, as already noted, meets with opposition, which is no less vehement among a large section of the Unionists than among the Liberals. Popular opinion, which, by common consent, makes him the scapegoat of the War Office measures, with or without good reason, considers that Lord Salisbury by his appointment, puts an affront upon the public judgment.

The appointment of William St. John Brodrick to succeed the Marquis of Lansdowne as Secretary of State for War is not seriously criticised, although the many friends and supporters of Mr. Geo. Wyndham, Parliamentary Secretary of the War Office, are disappointed that he was not made the head of the office. Mr. Wyndham's undoubted ability and high services will undoubtedly receive recognition in the allotment of offices still unfilled. His manifold social connections would seriously hamper him in the radical reforms which the new Minister of War must undertake.

The appointment of Lord Selborne as First Lord of the Admiralty is generally approved.

Moderate opinion does not oppose, indeed, it approves, the promotion of Lord Lansdowne, recalling his successful administrations as Viceroy of Canada and India. His supporters contend that he has special qualifications for a diplomatic position.

To vote for Hughes is to express satisfaction with the large increase of the public expenditures and debt!
