TWO live snakes were found in an Upper Province mail bag a few days ago. They had escaped from the box in which they had travelled by mail all the way from Austin, Texas.

A YOUNG lady at Riverside, Toronto, has been severely injured about the face and neck by bees which were attracted by the profuse trimmings of artificial flowers on her hat.

ST. JOHN had a terrific thunder storm on Monday. The lightning was vivid, and the rain descended in torrents. The storm was the heaviest known in St. John for a long time.

THE fourth competition for the Creamer medal took place at Kensington Rifle Range, on Monday. The scores at the close stood:—Capt. Stewart, 103; Sergt. McGregor, 104; Sergt. Allan, 103.

THE opponents of the Scott Act, in Fredericton, have secured a sufficient number of signatures to a petition, asking that another election may be held which, they claim, will result in the defeat of the Act.

BRADLAUGH and thirty others connected with the publication of the Freeholder were, last Friday, committed for trial on a charge of publishing blasphemous libels. Bradlaugh was subsequently bailed.

THE Fredericton Methodist Church has become jubilant over the possession of a first rate pipe organ. Fredericton is active in all its religious enterprises, and, as a counterpoise, it is said to possess the most abusive newspapers on the Continent.

BUFFALOONIANS are beginning to be alarmed at the large volume of wheat shipments from Chicago going to Montreal. The steady increase of orders in that direction incline them to believe that, should ocean freights continue low, and should grain drop in price, the traffic that way must become unpleasantly extensive.

JAMES H. CROCKET has brought a civil suit against H. A. Cropley, publisher and proprietor of the Fredericton Capital for recovery of \$5,000 damages for libel—alleged defamation of character. The writ was served by Sheriff Temple on the 24th. Gregory & Blair are the plaintiff's attorneys. Mr. Cropley has retained Fraser, Wetmore & Winslow, for the defence.

MESSERS DAVIDSON & CRICHTON, of Halifax, dry good merchants, recently received a letter from a Roman Catholic clergyman of Charlotetown, P. E. I., enclosing \$895 as restitution. The amount was a sum of which they had been defrauded, and the person who had so defrauded them desired to make restitution, and took this means of doing so.—Halifax Chronicle.

LEARNED FISH.—Mr. J. F. McDonald, barrister, of Ingersoll, has quite a curiosity in the way of educated fish. They are kept in a pond adjoining his residence, and are fed at regular intervals. When meal time arrives, they are called up by the party wishing to feed them, who whistles. The alarm is unanimously responded to, and the fish take their food from the hands of the attendant.

A WINNIPEG letter says: Provisions at present are excessively high. Potatoes realize \$2 to \$2.50 per bushel; butter, 35c per pound; eggs, 35c per dozen; beef steak, mutton, veal, etc., 30c per pound; strawberries, 50c per quart, and so on. Everything else in the same proportion. Tamarac wood, by the cord, \$8.50, poplar, \$6 to \$7. An ordinary dwelling house, with six to eight rooms, \$30 per month, and upwards. The demand is great.
