# TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

## GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, June 1.

Intense excitement prevailed at Clonmel yesterday, where sales of farms were announced to take place. At early morning a hundred well mounted and disciplined horsemen wearing green sashes preceded by bands and followed by an immense procession of people paraded the town. All the streets leading to the Court House were lined with police and military. All the shops and business places were closed. The sales passed off quietly and things went well until towards 6 o'clock, when a cry was raised that the local clergyman had been arrested. A shout went forth to rescue the priest. A rush was at once made on the police, but was repelled. The riot act was read, and the Hussars charged and recharged the mob, who hurled volleys after volleys of stones at the military, inflicting upon many of them severe injuries. Several policemen and civilians were also seriously injured. The injuries of one or two of the constabulary will, it is feared, prove fatal. The people afterwards gathered in the lower end of the town, where they were addressed by the representatives of the League. No arrests were made.

LONDON, June 1.

A report has reached here from Limerick that three policemen were killed during the riotous riots in the County Clare. Rioting in Clonmel has been resumed. The police and soldiers charged on the mob and injured several persons, finally clearing the streets.

The President of the Ballina, County Mayo branch of the Land League, has been arrested under the Coercion Act and taken to Kilmainham jail.

The News says: "When the House of Commons in committee on the Land Bill began the consideration of the measure there were 1,500 amendments to be considered. The result of two sittings has been to reduce this number by six. The principal one of these will come up for discussion on another day. At this rate of progress, supposing no fresh amendments are introduced, the House would have to sit daily for 567 days to complete the bill, but fresh amendments are added daily. Forty were handed in on Monday."

The Times in its leading article says "Parliament and the country have at length come to understand that the Land League is an aggressive organization and that it law does not put it down it will put down the laws."

## EUROPE AND THE EAST.

TUNIS, June 1.

All the newspaper correspondents and a large crowd of people attended M. Seguin's funeral. The murderer was a fanatic. Seguin had great experience in military campaigns, and was the author of a book called "The Next War," which was much noticed by the German papers.

BERLIN, June 1.

A farrowed banquet was given to-night to Mr. Andrew O. White, United States Minister at Kaiserhof, by the members of the Lower House, the Reichstag, Herr Rudolph presiding.

## UNITED STATES.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., June 1.

John Thompson killed Deputy Sheriff Charles and Samuel Meredith and L. Knight who attempted his arrest. Thompson escaped.

## A Novel Form of Landlordism.

An extensive and novel form of landlordism has been established in Iowa. Mr. Chase, representing some English capitalists, bought 10,000 acres of land, divided it into farms of 160 acres each, brought tenants from England, and now has it all under tillage. "Our system," Mr. Chase says, "is not to hold virgin land on the chance of a rise in value, but by building houses and ploughing the sod, to improve the property we buy and make it productive of income, wherein we conceive lies the distinction between legitimate business and speculation in land. Each 160 acres is let as a rule, to one tenant, who provides labor and machinery, paying us rent for wheat lands in kind, on the half-share system, and for Indian corn land about \$2 per acre. The tenant's own labor, with one assistant, usually a son, is enough, except at harvest time, to cultivate 160 acres, if divided between wheat and Indian corn. Thus our laborers are directly interested in the yield, and we think we combine the economy of large holdings with the efficiency and productivity of the small. In 1880 and 1881 we could have let our farms twice over. Every forty farms, or thereabouts, are placed under the superintendence of a steward, who is controlled directly by ourselves."

An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Chronicle says:—There is a rumor in ministerial circles that high imperial honors await Sir John A. Macdonald in England. It is even said he will be raised to the peerage and remain in England as a Law Lord of the Privy Council, and representative of Canada."

## The Synod.

FIRST DAY.

At the opening service in New Glasgow, N. B., says the correspondent of the St. John Telegraph, Rev. John B. Logan, the retiring moderator, preached from Acts 1st and 7th. The sermon was a neat, forcible and comforting exposition of the doctrine of God's overruling providence. He said that amid the trials and triumphs of the church, the stripes and storms and revolutions of communities and nations God reigns. Let Christians rest in his truth, even when God may not see fit to reveal his plan to us. After the devotional exercises, the Synod was constituted and the roll was called. The number of members present was about two hundred. Rev. Dr. Pollock was unanimously elected moderator. On taking the chair he delivered an exceedingly appropriate address. Dr. Pollock is evidently a great favorite with the Synod. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring moderator for the admirable manner in which he presided, and for the able discourse with which he opened the Synod.

Attention having been called to the fact that serious illness had broken out in the Island of Trinidad, and that it was feared the terrible scourge of yellow fever had actually appeared, Dr. McCulloch led the Synod in earnest prayer to God that he would protect the missionaries, and those among whom they labored, and give His servants strength and grace to qualify them for duty in such trying circumstances.

SECOND DAY.

The Presbytery of Sydney intimated to the Synod that they intended to petition the General Assembly to review the decision of last Synod respecting the Sydney case. Rev. D. McKee, and Rev. A. McLean Sinclair were appointed to represent the Synod before the Assembly.

Rev. Dr. McGregor gave a report of the Hunter building fund. During the past year the committee have made grants to weak congregations to the amount of \$1,550 and have loaned \$900 without interest and \$500 with interest. The total expenditure for all purposes was \$3,350; income, \$3,458. From the report it appears the fund has proved a great blessing to poor settlements and weak congregations. Many churches have been built in localities where the attempt would never have been made if it had not been for the aid and encouragement secured from this committee.

The Synod entered into the consideration of several overtures respecting the Young Ladies' Seminary, Dr. McCulloch, Rev. W. F. Archibald, Rev. T. Cummings, and Mr. Fleming Blanchard spoke in support of these overtures. They strongly urged the necessity of such institution. It was shown that the number of young ladies from our congregations at present attending institutions of other denominations would be sufficient to start one of the largest seminaries in the land. The proposal is to raise five hundred shares of \$20 a share, and all that is asked of the Synod is an official recognition and hearty recommendation to Presbyterians throughout the Maritime Provinces. The matter has been referred to a committee to outline a scheme and report to the Synod to-morrow forenoon.

Rev. S. G. Lawson was heard at length, on his appeal from the decision of the Presbytery of this Island.
