Prorogation of Parliament.

Governor General's Speech

OTTAWA, Oct. 1. Parliament prorogued yesterday. The attendance of members was small. But the Governor General's speech was lengthy. He referred to Sir John Macdonald's death, to the Behring Sea seal fishery modus vivendi with the United States, and to various legislative enactments. He congratulated Parliament on the continuance of general prosperity as a result of the bountiful harvest, and upon the reduction of the sugar duties. He referred to the frauds practised upon the Government by contractors, and the intention of the Government to punish them. He also spoke of the Civil Service Commission to be appointed and to the Commission to enquire into prohibition of the liquor traffic.

PARIS, Oct. 1. General Boulanger committed suicide by shooting himself through the head yesterday, at noon, at the grave of his mistress, Madame de Bouvenain, at Brussels. There is great excitement in French circles.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1. Some trouble occurred here yesterday when the mill-owners attempted shipping lumber. Some of the strikers interfered to prevent them. The police were called on and restored order. There were a few broken heads.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1. Reports from the fishing stations in the west of Ireland indicate a breakdown of the mackerel curing industry, which furnishes supply to the American markets.

Political Prisoners.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. It is reported that excitement is increasing at Guatemala and that the prisons are filled with political prisoners.

Uneasiness in Brazil.

PANAMA, Oct. 1. There has been a revolutionary agitation in several of the provinces of Brazil, causing the government a great deal of uneasiness.

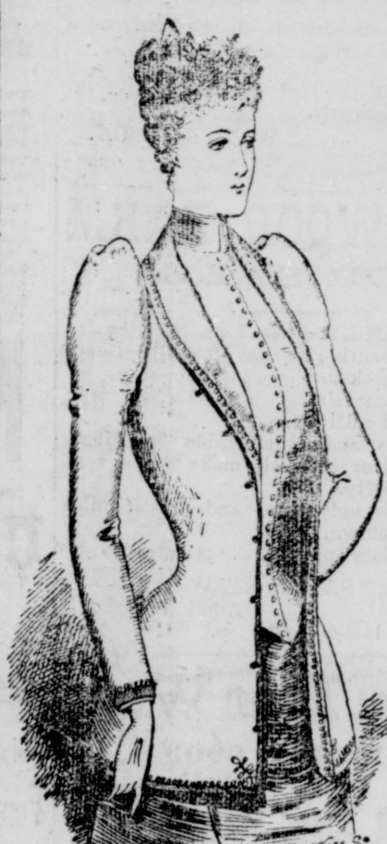
