The New Perth 4-H Club held its first annual achievement day at the farm of J. Lincoln Dewar on Saturday afternoon with all sixteen members participating. The feminine members walked off with the majority of honors. Mr. James Cain, who is the club leader, stated that he was very pleased with the enthusiasm shown in the year's work as well as the results.

A novel feature of the day was a tractor Road-e-o which was won by Miss Jean LeLacheur who had an almost perfect score of 96 points. The course consisted of driving a tractor and trailer out of a shed, backing up to a platform and loading a can of milk. Following this the driver had to steer his equipment between four blocks placed to allow little room for error. This was followed by a left hand turn between four more blocks, driving up to the side of a platform, unloading the can and returning to the shed into which the driver must back his tractor and trailer. It was a difficult course indeed for the members who all did an exceptional job. Mr. Dave MacLean was the Judge for this event.

Miss Audrey MacMillan very capably judged the calf entries in which Miss Joyce Dewar took top honors with her calf for showmanship and year's work. For this she was presented with the Lou Roper Shield. Miss Dewar had 97.7 points out of a possible 100.

Useful Knowledge Stressed To Teachers At Souris

"If only what we use becomes a part of us, why do we teach in schools so many facts we'll never use? Or, if a few may use them why inflict them on every pupil?"

These questions were asked the teachers of Eastern Kings in the course of a speech delivered Thursday by the Convention President, Mr. Daniel MacDonald, St. Peter's.

The fall convention of local teachers, an annual two-day event, concluded Friday in Souris. Approximately fifty-five members of the profession attended.

Mr. MacDonald who is Principal of the St. Charles High School used the queries to introduce the theme of his address, "What we don't use, we lose."

Developing his subject, Mr. MacDonald told the assembled teachers: "We are aware that unused muscles fail to develop; that unused houses deteriorate; that unused soil produces weeds; that unused ideas are soon forgotten. On the other hand though we learned to count when very young, we can still do so. That is because we continue to count through the years. What we use becomes a habit. What we don't use, we lose. Why waste precious hours, therefore, learning something we'll never use?"

Mr. MacDonald said that he did not consider it wise to teach children only what they might use when they became adults, declaring that this theory was based on the incorrect assumption that "the brain is a cold storage tank from which we may draw, when needed, the facts stored years ago."

then using that knowledge in the future," the group president asserted.

TEACHING OBJECTIVES

Among human accomplishments that should be developed thoroughly by means of our school system, Mr. MacDonald included the following: correct, pleasing speech; the habit of reading; a good knowledge of nutrition; the ability to "get along" with other people; a knowledge of and interest in the proper use of the soil; the ability to budget time; punctuality.

Mr. MacDonald criticized strongly those teachers who he said, "commit professional suicide by mis-interpretation and misuse of the curriculum." The president to the teachers' local also condemned certain school boards for what he termed "facing the past."

PARENTS SCOLDED

"Parents," the convention speaker declared, "who criticize the politics, religion, social characteristics, or social financial standings of their neighbors are building prejudice and intolerance in their children. Can't we allow the lights of the good life into our cloudy minds. It will add to our own happiness and immeasurably help the next generation."

"We need a committee of laymen to act with professionals in all phases of welfare. We need an education that leads us out of our isolation complex. When farmers have this and not until then, their children may want to stay on the farm, if it can be made productive."

"The school as a community centre must develop to keep pace with material improvement," the speaker concluded.

CHANGES AFFECTING CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES INCOME TAX EXEMPTION

A CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITY, contracted for by a taxpayer on his own life, may now qualify for Registration as a Retirement Savings Plan under the Income Tax Act.

Premiums paid on such a CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITY may now be deducted from earned income thus effecting a saving in personal income tax.

The amount you may deduct is subject to the following conditions:

- If you are not now a member of a Registered Pension Fund or Plan, you may deduct Canadian Government Annuities premiums up to 10% of earned income, but not exceeding \$2,500 a year.
- If you are currently a member of a Registered Pension Fund or Plan, you may deduct the premium paid on a Canadian Government Annuity contract and the contributions made under your present Pension Fund, but the combined payments eligible for deduction cannot exceed 10% of your earned income, to a maximum of \$1,500 a year.

LOWER PREMIUM RATES

Purchasers of Canadian Government Annuities after April 1, 1957, will benefit from reduced premium rates reflecting an increase in the interest rate.
