

# Business Men Are Given Plenty Food For Thought

Businessmen had plenty to mull over last week. It started with the first public address by Mitchell Sharp in his new role of finance minister and moved on to the second annual report of the Economic Council of Canada.

Then, before most readers had skinned through the report's introduction, came a 10-per-cent hike in the domestic price of copper. The increase promptly started swirling through the economy as several major copper users passed it on to customers.

Mr. Sharp's speech to the Canadian Club of Toronto triggered three main lines of speculation.

First, was the warning against hopes of meaningful tax cuts this year when he noted federal

government spending will be higher, while the provinces will be picking up a larger share of tax revenues?

Secondly, did he mean the government is seriously considering lifting the six-per-cent interest ceiling on bank loans when he said it plans to promote competition among financial institutions for the benefit of the public?

Finally, what was the significance — if any — of his saying Canada will have to "forego some of the advantages of spending now" if it is to develop without large net imports of capital? Did it presage a return to the living-within-your-means arguments of a few years ago?

The report of the Economic Council must have come as a jolt to anyone starting to feel complacent because of the surprising growth of the Canadian economy in 1965.

It not only said productivity will have to expand at a greater rate than it did last year if Canada's economic goals for 1970 are to be met, but it also indicated that the manpower situation is so bad any growth may be harder than ever to come by. Labor will likely get worse during the next five years, threatening Canada's continued prosperity, unless remedial steps are taken.

It called for a vast and immediate increase in the "crucially important factor" of education for both adults and youngsters to improve the effectiveness of the human role in productivity.

"There is at present a general shortage of man power with higher educational and skill qualifications," it said.

spades were not divided 3-3. Declarer would go down one, losing two club tricks and a spade.

The objection to this method of play is that it fails to take into consideration the possibility of West's having the doubleton ten of spades. Since this is something that occurs in about 8 per cent of all deals, it is a factor not to be ignored.

Planning to take a spade finesse is certainly the proper approach to the play, but when to take the finesse is a matter of at least equal importance. The proper time for the finesse is immediately, that is, right after winning the opening lead with the ace of hearts.

At trick two, therefore, you lead the two of spades to the jack. When the finesse succeeds you lead out your trumps and then play a low spade to the king.

In the actual hand, West has to play the ten on the king, and when you now return a spade from dummy, you are able to finesse the nine with assurance that the finesse will succeed.

It does take a certain amount of foresight to realize the importance of playing a low spade from dummy at trick two, but, after all, one is expected to always look ahead and anticipate the answer to problems which might eventually come up.

# Economic Drive Being Made In Southwestern Manitoba

WINNIPEG (CP) — Municipal and provincial governments are co-operating in a drive to stimulate economic growth in southwestern Manitoba.

WEST-MAN Regional Development Inc. is comprised of 62 municipalities with a total area of about 13,000 square miles and a population of more than 100,000.

Purpose of the corporation is to study the region's economic problems and potentials and to help municipalities — individually and collectively — with specific projects.

Under provincial legislation the Manitoba government will provide the corporation with technical and financial aid.

"Give the people the tools to work with and they will go on from there," said Ronald Kinney, senior consultant with the provincial industry and commerce department.

Mr. Kinney said most of the corporation's work will be concentrated in four areas — industry and commerce, tourism, agriculture and other resources, and publicity.

Representatives from the Manitoba agriculture department will work closely with those of the industry and commerce department to develop opportunities for farmers to benefit from new industry — for example, by providing raw materials or labor.

The corporation will be financed by an annual assessment based on population — 20 cents per capita in rural areas, 30 cents in villages and 40 cents in towns and the city of Brandon. The Manitoba government will match these funds dollar for dollar and provide an additional \$500 for each municipality the first year. The 1966 budget is estimated at about \$90,000.

The copper price increase, to 45 cents a pound from 40 1/2 cents, came the day after Prime Minister Pearson had warned about inflationary price and wage pressures in the economy.

The third in a year — together they amount to a 29-per-cent increase — was justified as reflecting a recent four-cent hike in the export price of copper to 42 cents (U.S.) by major world producers.

Following the increase, most wire and cable makers raised their prices from about six per cent on some Canadian General Electric Co. products, to 15 per cent on all copper products of Industrial Wire and Cable Ltd.

A Canadian Westinghouse Co. spokesman said the higher copper price was one of several factors that have prevented price reductions on many consumer appliances recently.

The increases were established by Canada's three major copper producers — Noranda Mines Ltd., International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd. and Hudson Bay Mining and Smelting Co. Ltd.

**Bennett Wins Slander Case**

VANCOUVER (CP) — Premier W. A. C. Bennett has won dismissal of a slander suit brought against him by the dismissed chairman of the B.C. Purchasing Commission George E. P. Jones.

Mr. Justice H. W. McInnes in B.C. Supreme Court ruled remarks last March contained no slander of Jones, either in the natural, ordinary meaning of the words or in the innuendo Jones claimed.

At no time during the two days of the suit did Premier Bennett appear in court. The case opened Dec. 21 but the following day was adjourned until Jan. 10 while the judge considered arguments on points of law.

Jones' counsel Tom Berger said he had not decided whether to appeal.
