A COSTLY LUXURY

The Bill of the Canadian Commissioners to Date:

OTTAWA, June 19.—A return brought down shows that the total amount expended by the Canadian members of the High Joint Commission to date reaches the substantial sum of \$33,994. Of this amount, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's expenses totalled \$3,821, Sir Richard Cartwright's \$2,900, Sir L. H. Davies' \$2,600, Mr. Charlton, M.P., \$1,766, Mr. Bourassa, M.P., secretary of the commission, \$2,200; Mr. Pope, Under-Secretary of State, \$1,851; Mr. Parmelee, Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce, \$923; Mr. O'Hara, Sir Richard's secretary, \$1,336; Mr. King, chief astronomer, \$1,315; Mr. Veening, Fisheries Department, \$1,130; Mr. Gordon, Sir L. H. Davies' secretary, \$1,050; and Mr. Boudreau, the Premier's secretary, \$866. For printing and stationery there was paid \$1,991, for office rent \$1,814, entertainments \$1,639, tips to servants \$407, cabs, including baggage, \$218, luncheons at Quebec \$176, cards and printing \$96, photographs \$46, towels \$15, soap and matches \$11, crockery \$12, etc.

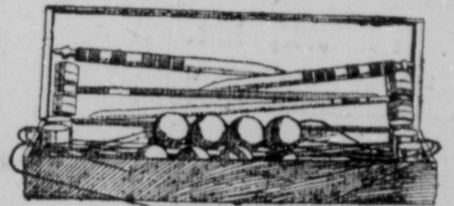
