TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 24. There were five deaths to-day and 113 new cases officially reported. One doctor had 130 cases, few of which have been reported, showing that official reports give little idea of the extent of the epidemic. Fever has appeared at Fernandina, and the town is being depopulated.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.

The Post Office Department received several telegrams from the yellow fever district which indicate the running of trains on nearly all roads in Alabama and Mississippi has been abandoned, and the whole section panic stricken.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 24.

On account of the rigid quarantine regulations in Mississippi all through freight and passenger trains on the Alabama Great Southern Railway were discontinued after last night. A line of pickets has been placed around the city, and will be kept up night and day until all danger is past. No alarm is felt, but business is seriously affected.

Shocking Tragedy.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 24.

An extraordinary story comes from Cow Bay, C. B. Three little boys were playing "killing pigs" to-day. One, the six-year old son of Mrs. Anderson, who keeps the village hotel, was bound hand and foot by his two companions and thrown upon the ground, when his throat was cut with an old rusty, blunt knife. The little fellow has died from the effect of the wound. The tragedy was enacted "in play," and the perpetrators are too young to arrest, but the affair has caused intense excitement in the county.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.

Lord Stanley will return here to-night and open the Ottawa Exhibition to-morrow. Prof. Macoun, in an interview to-day, gave a glowing description of the advantages and possibilities of Prince Edward Island.

The fever stricken residents of Memphis have wired Prof. Wiggins to ascertain when they may expect the mercury to drop. He has replied that they are without hope until October 6th.

Accidentally Shot.

HALIFAX, Sept. 24.

Two youths went partridge shooting at Brooklyn, Hants County, on Saturday morning. One named Harvey, aged 16 years, was accidentally shot by his companion and his brains were blown out. There are no particulars yet.

The Truro Exhibition.

TRURO, N. S., Sept. 25.

Lieutenant-Governor McLellan opened the Provincial Exhibition here to-day at 2 o'clock. Henry Longworth, Esq., Wm. Brown and W. F. Carter are among the judges. No Island horses start in the races till to-morrow.

The Pitcher Case.

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.

In the Pitcher case to-day motions in arrest of sentence were dismissed. The prisoner, who is the defaulting teller of the Union Bank of Providence, R. I., was convicted of bringing stolen money into Canada. He will be sentenced to-morrow.

Attempted Suicide.

HALIFAX, Sept. 24.

J. R. Jennett, who once kept a large crockery store here, jumped off the Dartmouth boat this evening and was rescued with difficulty. He is supposed to have been drinking.

Smallpox in Toronto.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 24.

Two more cases of smallpox have broken out here, both being in the same house on Agnes St. at where one of the other cases already reported was discovered. This makes four cases altogether.
