To Place Airmen's Case Before U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP)—Henry Cabot Lodge announced Friday night the 16 Korean allies have agreed to place before the UN assembly as soon as possible the 11 American fliers jailed as spies in Red China.

The chief U. S. delegate to the UN made the announcement after a meeting of representatives of the allies in Lodge's office.

Lodge told reporters: "We had a meeting of the 16 and there is marvellous and inspiring unanimity on the vital need to get release of the 11 American men and of all others who fought as members of the UN command and are detained in violation of the Korean armistice agreement."

"We reached agreement that we would take the matter up in the General Assembly at the earliest possible date."

DIAMOND ANNIVERSARY OF FIRST PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE PAPER

The initial issue of the Prince of Wales College Times, for 1954-55, marks the diamond jubilee of the college paper which was first published in the year 1894 under the name of the "Record".

An interesting article relates that the first three members of the "Record", whose picture appears in this issue, were: Norman Hunter, Alberton; Talmage MacMillan, Cornwall and Hedley V. MacKinnon, Charlottetown. A brief history of the college shows that Norman Hunter in second year received the Governor General's Prize. He later moved to the United States where he studied medicine. Dr. Hunter died two years ago.

Talmage MacMillan who was a brother of Gordon MacMillan, Cornwall and Ewen MacMillan, York Point, entered Prince of Wales as a very young man. After leaving Prince of Wales he entered McGill University but died on the year of his graduation. Hedley MacKinnon entered Prince of Wales from West Kent School and attended for two years. He was in the first contingent sent to Africa in 1900. Upon returning to Canada he took up newspaper work and later became editor of a publication in Saint John, N. B. He died about four years ago.

DR. MacKINNON'S COMMENTS
In commenting on the jubilee year Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of the College, has this to say: "In the sixty years since the first issue, The College paper has made an important contribution to Prince of Wales. Its news, articles, gossip and jokes have been part of the spirit of the place and successive generations have given much time and effort to it. Only this summer a respected Island lady told me how she stood in the main hall of the old college building selling the first issues in 1894. Many others have similar memories."

Two outstanding events were featured in the Auditorium of Prince of Wales College last night when Group Captain W. H. Sweetman, DSO, DFC, CD, Commanding Officer of the RCAF station Summerside presented air cadet wings to two members of 60 (Charlottetown) Squadron and Gordon B. Rayner presented the Group Captain Lewis trophy for proficiency to the squadron.

The air cadet wings were presented to F/Sgt. Alan MacLeod, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leith MacLeod and Sgt. Irwin Buell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Buell, both of Charlottetown.

The trophy award was "to the most proficient squadron on the Island" and has been passing back and forward between the city and their friendly rivals in Summerside from time to time. The presentation was made by Mr. Rayner, provincial chairman of the Cadet League of Canada and accepted on behalf of the local unit by their commanding officer, F/L W. S. MacLeod.

Following the presentations the squadron was addressed briefly by Group Captain Sweetman who said he was very much impressed by the splendid group on parade. He spoke of the early years of organized work on behalf of the air cadets and was happy to say that the movement was now healthier than ever. Touching on the benefits to be derived by the cadets through the training they received, he commended all concerned for the splendid civilian support given the cadets and their sponsors, the R. C. A. F. Association.

There was a large attendance of relatives and friends of the air cadets present to witness the presentations.

POSSIBILITY OF HOLDUP IN FEDERAL BUILDING PROJECT

There is said to be a distinct possibility that construction work on the new Federal Building in Charlottetown may be suspended in late January because of delay in obtaining materials. It is believed that some difficulty is being experienced in securing steel promptly and that strong efforts are being made to have the deficiency made good.

The Anglin-Norcross Company, which has the contract for the work, is said to be very anxious to continue the job without interruption. It is understood that the possibility of closing down the job was a topic of discussion when the Dominion Minister of Public Works was in Charlottetown a short time ago, and that the Minister's help was asked to prevent such an outcome.
