PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY, May 2.

At the afternoon session, Hon. Mr. McNutt tabled the Stock Farm Report. Hon. Mr. Farquharson, in reply to Mr. Shaw, said the report of Mr. Wise, Commissioner to Great Britain, would be ready in a short time. Hon. Mr. Farquharson introduced a bill amending the Liquor Regulation Act, which was ordered to be read a second time tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the House went into committee on the bill incorporating the Prince Edward Island Dairy Association, Mr. Reid taking the chair.

The bill provides that the Association shall have power to appoint an instructor or instructors with power to examine all factories and give such instruction as may be deemed necessary in order to promote the dairy industry. It also provides that the directors shall have power to levy a tax according to the output of each factory, not to exceed \$600, for the payment of such instructor, and also makes provision for carrying into effect such arrangement as may be necessary to advance the dairy industry including the formation of a Dairyman's Board of Trade.

In committee the bill was discussed by the Leader of the Government, the Attorney-General, Mr. Birch, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Sinclair, Mr. Shaw, Mr. McKinnon, Mr. Richards, Mr. D. A. McKinnon. Mr. Birch expressed himself as opposed to the measure, claiming that it was too sweeping and that the factories were doing very well under the existing arrangements. The other speakers favored the object of the measure.

In reply to a question asked by Mr. McKinnon, Premier Farquharson said he had stated at the dairymen's meeting last winter that the Local Government would pay one-third at least of the instructors salary. Professor Robertson then stated that he believed \$300 would be voted by the Dominion Government and it was only fair that the Association should incur the balance not to exceed \$600.

Progress was reported after it had been agreed to let three or four clauses stand over for further consideration.

On motion of Mr. D. A. McKinnon the House went into committee on the bill incorporating the Prince Edward Island Mutual Fire Insurance Company, Mr. McWilliams in the chair.

The House stands adjourned until 10 a. m. on Thursday.

DEATH OF MRS. GORDON.

Mother of Mrs. Dillon Lately of Charlottetown.

Several of the Upper Province papers publish long accounts of the death of the mother of Mrs. Thos. J. Dillon, recently of Charlottetown. The deceased was the wife of Mr. Robert Gordon, treasurer of the township of Arthur, ex-postmaster of Kentworth, and ex-Conservative candidate for the Commons in North Welling Co. Mrs. Gordon was the devoted and highly respected wife of a respected man and her husband and family of two sons and two daughters have the sympathy of a large number of friends in their loss. Deceased who was a daughter of the late Mr. MacKay, of Kentworth was one of the earliest settlers in that township, and was born in Danganoo, County Tyrone, Ireland.

Her death was unexpected. In this connection the Arthur Enterprise points out that "It was known by many that the deceased had been ill for some time with a pleuritic lung trouble, but none save those in immediate attendance, if even they, expected it would have a fatal termination. A relapse, however, after a partial recovery, combined with a fresh attack embracing both lungs, speedily did the fatal work, and on Saturday last, in the early part of her 65th year, the overtaxed system yielded in the struggle and death added another to his many victims in this and surrounding localities during the part of the present year already passed away." The funeral, according to the same paper, consisted of a long procession of vehicles. The services at the house and at the grave were conducted by Rev. J. J. Patterson, pastor of St. Andrew's, who paid a deserved tribute to the memory of the deceased.
