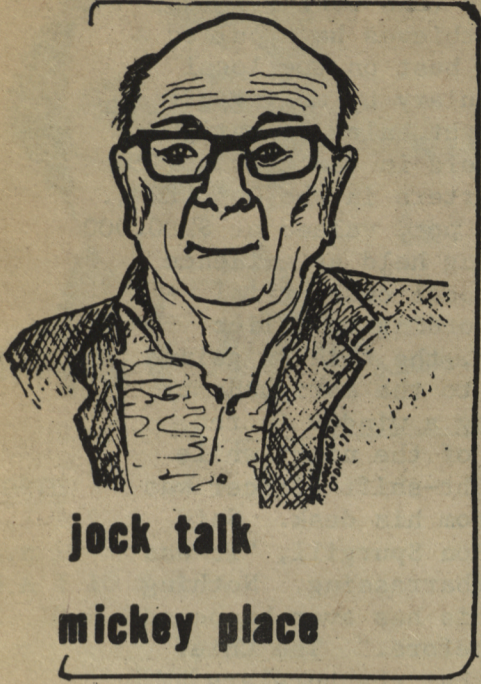


Soccer panthers lead the way with pair
