GENERAL HUTTON AND THE CANADIAN DIANS

Praises Their 'Exceptional Performance'

MEN SELECTED ON THEIR QUALIFICATIONS

And Win Success by Cleverly Executed Movements.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—General Hutton has written a letter to the Governor-General, under date June 20, enclosing a copy of his field report, made to Lord Roberts in reference to an engagement in the neighborhood of Pretoria upon the 18th and 19th of June, in which a detachment of Canadian Mounted Rifles took so distinguished a part. He says: "I cannot allow so exceptional a performance and so difficult and dangerous and delicate duty to pass without bringing the whole detachment by name to Your Excellency's notice."

"I would add that the detachment was specially selected on account of the qualification of the men and of the condition of their horses for this particular service mentioned in the despatch to Lord Roberts."

These are mentioned in the despatch to Lord Roberts: Lieut. F. V. Young, Manitoba Dragoons; Sergeant R. H. Ryan, King's Canadian Hussars; Sergeant Pardon, Duke of York's own Hussars.

General Hutton further gives details of the affair at Klip Kop which have already been reported.

Lieut. Young had charge of the squad and crossed the river so as to take Klip Kop from the rear. To this cleverly-executed movement the General attributes the success which followed.

A cluster of farms were taken in reverse and surprised. Between forty and fifty men were dispersed, and on close search two guns were found in a position to defend the farms from a frontal attack.

Lieut. Young got oxen and carried the guns away.

IN THE LAST DITCH.

Kruger at Lorenzo Marques.

LORENZO MARQUES, Sept. 12.—President Kruger and several Transvaal officials are staying at the house of Mr. Pott, Consul of the Netherlands here. It is rumored that he will start for Europe on the 24th, on the German steamer Hertzog.

Nothing But Bones.

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—Henry Hobbs, a farmer, who lives near Cherry Grove, has discovered a number of bones belonging to what was evidently a gigantic mastodon. Up to date about fifty bones have been discovered, and the search is now being pushed with the object of discovering the head of the mastodon. The most interesting and striking portion of the remains is a huge curved tusk which measures more than nine feet from the base to the tip, the base being more than a foot in circumference.

VANDALISM AT GALVESTON

Stripping and Mutilating Public Buildings and Dead Bodies.

A HUNDRED BAD NEGROES ARRESTED

Forty-three Tried by Court Martial, and Sentenced to be Shot.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 13.—W. R. McGrath, manager of the Dallas Electric Company, reached here today, direct from Galveston.

He said that the vandalism in Galveston has been horrible. The most rigid enforcement of martial law has not been able to suppress it entirely.

Adjutant-General Surrie's men have arrested a hundred or more negroes, forty-three of whom were found with effects taken from dead bodies. These were ordered to be tried by court martial. They were convicted and ordered to be shot. One negro had twenty-three fingers with rings on them in his pocket.

BIG FIRE IN PARIS, ONTARIO

Public Buildings and Places of Business Wiped Out.

LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$350,000.

About \$125,000 of Which is Covered By Insurance.

PARIS, Ont., Sept. 13.—The business portion of this town has been almost wiped out by fire.

The fire started in the Meldrum flour mills and quickly spread across Main street and on each side of the frame-built mill across the river.

The Post Office, Custom House, Canadian Bank of Commerce and Incandescent Electric Light Station were the first to follow the mill, and thence the flames spread in all directions.

The loss is estimated at \$350,000, with about \$125,000 insurance.

AT GALVESTON.

Loss of Lives and Distress of Living

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 12.—The Post correspondent was instructed to forward the following address to the people of the United States:

"GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 11.—It is my opinion, based on personal information, that five thousand people have lost their lives here. Approximately one-third of the resident portion of the city has been swept away. There are several thousand people who are homeless and destitute. How many there is no way of finding out. Arrangements are now being made to have the women and children sent to Houston and other places, but the means of transportation are limited. Thousands are still to be cared for here. We appeal to you for immediate aid.
