Guest Speaker Praises Island Tourist Facilities

SUMMERSIDE — "This province is certainly up in the forefront in accommodations as far as restaurant and motel facilities are concerned, as far as I can see in the short time I've been here, and there's no doubt that more and more tourists will be visiting here each year", said A.H. Ashforth, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce as he addressed the Summerside Rotary Club at their regular luncheon meeting yesterday at Mulberry Lodge.

Mr. Ashforth stated he was very impressed with tourist facilities and the scenery of the Island and especially noted how happy he was to have had a chance to see where the famous Malpeque oysters come from, as he stated he had often enjoyed them over the years.

Mr. Ashforth, whose home is in Toronto, was introduced by Amos H. Hubley, a Rotarian and president of the Summerside Board of Trade.

During his remarks Mr. Ashforth told of some of his impressions during a visit to Moscow as a member of a trade delegation.

Foreign Minister Gromyko advanced the Soviet plan on a take-it-or-suffer-it-the-consequences basis.

Speaking rapidly, he told the conference:

"The Soviet delegation must say that if the Western powers do not agree to introduce for the transitional period of one year the minimum measures with regard to West Berlin, the Soviet Union will not be willing to confirm its consent to the continuation of the occupation regime in West Berlin."

"If the Western powers and the government of West Germany hinder the reaching within the specified time limit of agreed decisions on the questions relating to the conclusion of a peace treaty, then the Soviet Union, along with other interested states which fought against Germany, will be compelled to sign a peace treaty with the (East) German Democratic Republic."

In other words, Gromyko made it plain that the one-year time limit, tied in with other Berlin proposals also completely unacceptable to the West, represented a concession in the Soviet view.

AT FORT AUGUSTUS

One car of a 19-car freight train was derailed at Fort Augustus crossing earlier yesterday afternoon.

The front truck of a railway car jumped the tracks at the crossing and went approximately one-quarter of a mile before coming to a halt.

The accident occurred at approximately 4 p.m. when the extra freight was proceeding from Murray Harbour, to Charlottetown via Mount Stewart.

A wrecking crew from Charlottetown was called out and arrived at the scene at 3.30 p.m. with a wrecking crane and other heavy equipment.

No one was injured in the wreck which was expected to be cleared at a late hour last evening. The cause of the derailment was not immediately known.

The engineer was James Leitch and the conductor was John Court.

volume and dollar terms," he said that "while we can expect renewed economic growth, it is not likely to be of sufficient magnitude to bring the economy to a full employment level."

In conclusion, The Canadian Chamber president took time out for a flashback and a look ahead on world achievements and events saying, "Twenty five years ago crystal gazers were talking of such things as passenger airplanes crossing the ocean at 400 miles per hour, television and atomic energy. We take encouragement when the experts forecast what we shall have in the next 25 years."

Soviet Ultimatum Rejected By West

GENEVA (AP) — The West Wednesday rejected what it described as a Soviet ultimatum seeking to place a one-year limit on Western rights in Berlin.

The Soviet Union matched this at the Big Four foreign ministers' meeting with a new threat to sign a separate peace with Communist East Germany and to remove Moscow's "consent" to continue Western garrisoning of West Berlin.

Both threats raised the spectre of a new Berlin blockade.

The ministers' talks now appear to be teetering on the brink of a complete breakdown.

U.S. State Secretary Herter, with the backing of his British and French colleagues, declared that the United States "will never negotiate under deadlines, threats or duress."
