IMPERIAL FEDERATION.

A Meeting Disturbed.

MONTREAL, July 27. Col. Howard Vincent addressed a large meeting here on Saturday evening in favor of Imperial Federation. Upon the proposal of a resolution endorsing the scheme, Peter Mitchell created a disturbance which became so great that the chairman adjourned the meeting without putting the resolution.

The Assassin at Work.

PARIS, July 27. An attempt was made last week in Paris to assassinate Madame Constant, wife of the Minister of the Interior, by an infernal machine, sent to her concealed in a prayer book. The explosive was sufficient to have demolished the house.

A Distinct Repudiation.

OTTAWA, July 27. This morning's papers contain a distinct and most emphatic repudiation by Lady Macdonald and Hugh John Macdonald of Col. MacPherson's biography of Sir John Macdonald.

Fatal Railway Accident.

CLEVELAND, July 27. An accident to an excursion train, yesterday, at Dayton, Ohio, caused great havoc. Many passengers were wounded, several killed, and others are dying.

INDIANAPOLIS, July 27. An earthquake shock created a panic last evening in Evansville, Indiana.

General Telegraphic News.

BERLIN, July 24.—The government is convinced that the exchange is operating to create a lightness in the grain market, and is considering measures to check speculation in grain. Chancellor von Caprivi adheres to his determination not to change the duties on grain, as the prospects of the crops are now excellent.

LONDON, July 24.—Advices just received from Stanley Falls, in the Congo Free State, tell of cannibalism among the natives and of an armed expedition against them. Natives along the Lomane River who had blocked the stream with hundreds of armed canoes, killed and ate 50 natives friendly to Europeans. An expedition composed of 10 Europeans and 50 Arabs soon after left Stanley Falls to punish the cannibals and after a day's battle succeeded in routing them and occupying their villages. Hundreds of rebellious natives were killed and wounded. The same advices also state that the Bekumas around Stanley Falls are returning to cannibalism and that several of them have been court-martialed and executed.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Coroner Levy visited the immigrant landing bureau to-day with bondsmen prepared to qualify in any sum up to \$100,000 to secure the freedom of 60 Russian Jews detained as likely to become public charges. Supt. Owens was present and after a brief conference Mr. Levy offered \$1,000 bonds for each immigrant, the bond stipulating that if any of the people were to become charges upon the public the bondsmen would either provide necessary sustenance here or furnish return tickets to the old country. This was accepted and the people permitted to land. Coroner Levy is vice-president of the Jewish Alliance of America.

ROUNDT, N. Y., July 24.—Augustus Lewis, 47 years old, was arrested at Ellenville, to-day, and placed in jail here to await action of the grand jury on a charge of bigamy. He is said to have no less than eight living wives in this state. They range in age from 22 to 50 years.

EXETER, Ont., July 23.—As the result of severe boating at the hands of Carl Brinker, some three weeks ago, August Kanning, a respectable farmer, went insane. Yesterday he hanged himself and Brinker has been arrested.

NOT ON TIME.—The Law Court's clock didn't strike all the hours last evening, and to-day is several minutes astray. The Cathedral clock hasn't struck the hour for a me time past. What's the matter?

RAYMOND EXCURSION PARTY.—The Raymond Excursion party of twenty-two, which arrived here in the steamer from Pictou on Friday evening, left again via Summerside this morning. The party stopped at the Hotel Davies while in the city.

CHARLOTTETOWN DRIVING PARK.—The rumor that Elmo was to give an exhibition at the Park last Saturday, brought together a number of horsemen. After several local flyers had been put through their paces, Elmo was recognized coming toward the grand stand, being driven by Mr. R. Steele. After a few preliminary turns he was sent down the course. As he passed the wire several watches were set going, and the track was turned the time recorded as 1.12 1/2. As this is his second appearance on the track this summer, the performance of Saturday is wonderful. Dr. Strickland, Elmo's owner, thinks his ability to lower his record of 2.27 1/2, is beyond the shadow of a doubt.

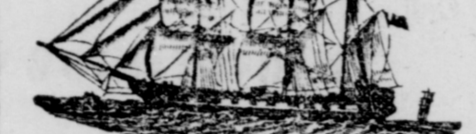

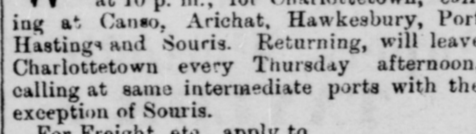

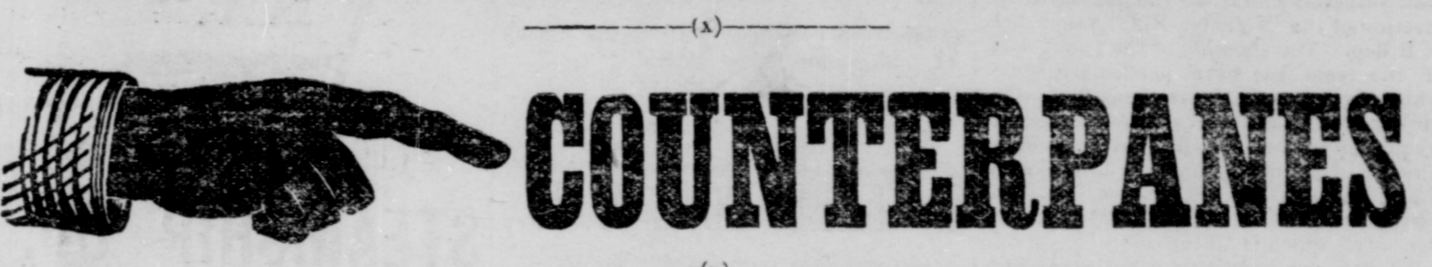
