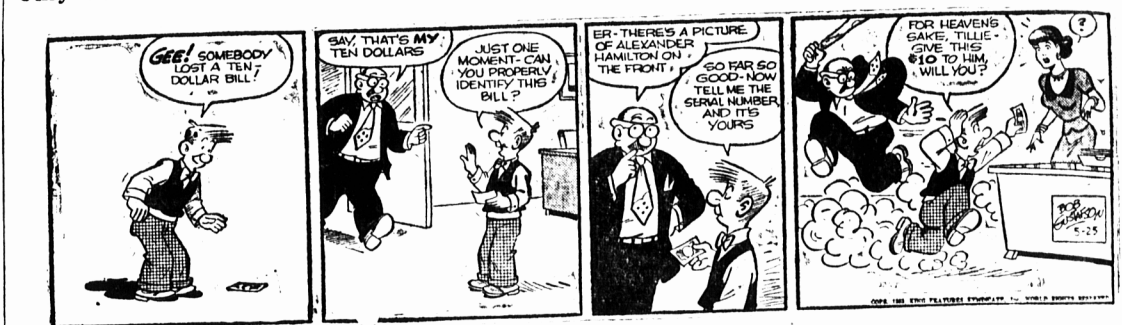

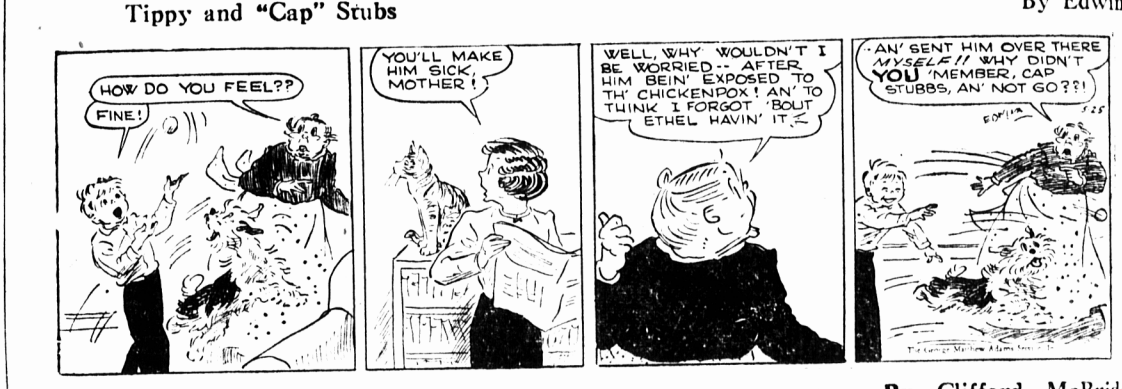

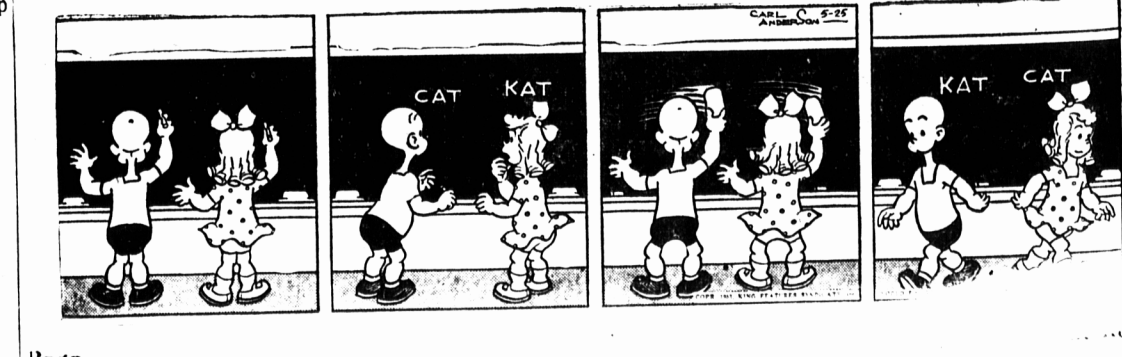

### HISTORIC HILL

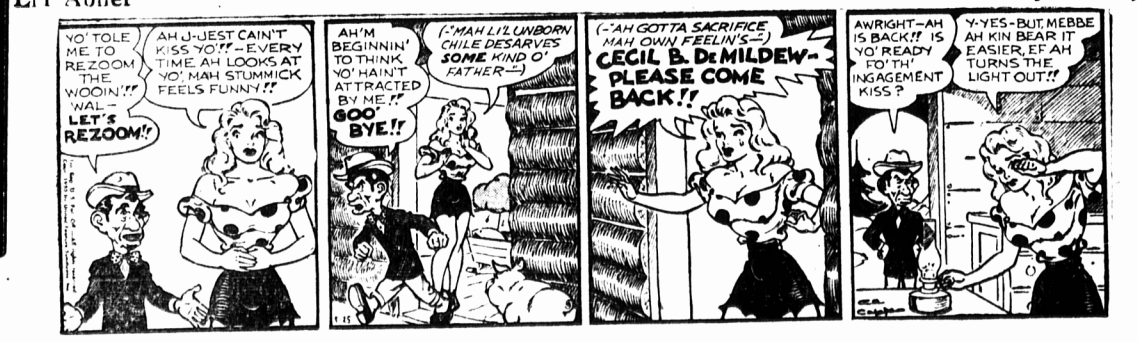

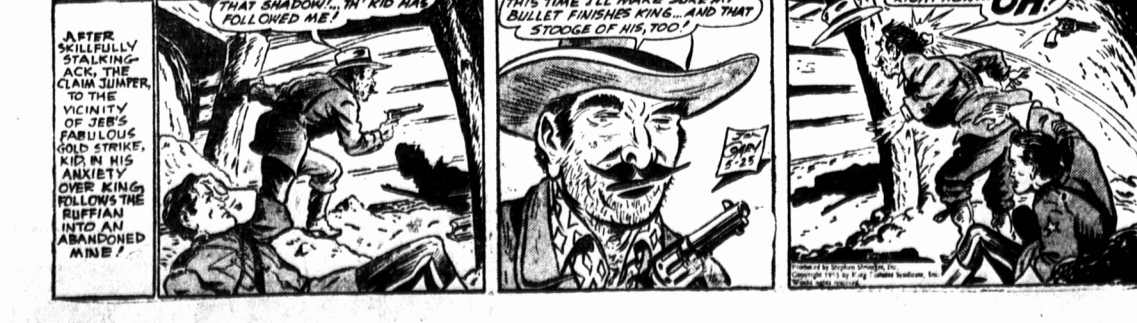
