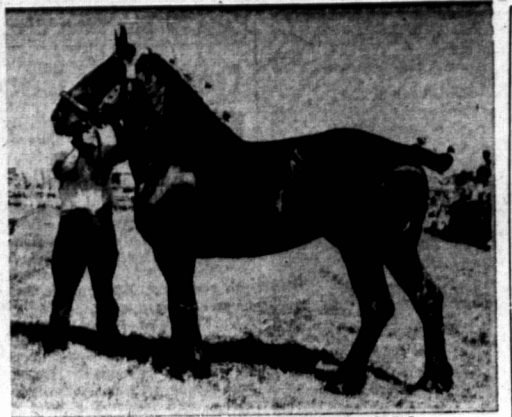

Dance Concludes 2-Day Exhibition At Alberton

A most successful two-day exhibition at Alberton came to a close last evening with the annual exhibition dance. Music for modern dancing was by the Lowell Huestis Orchestra and for old time dancing by the Leonard Barnett Orchestra. On both days the weather was all that could be desired and throngs of people enjoyed every moment of the best exhibition yet. Much credit is due the management and to the exhibitors. A word of commendation is due the Boy Scouts of O'Leary who directed the parking of cars with such courtesy and efficiency. At the conclusion of judging which continued until late in the afternoon, there was a sale of livestock. Judging of horses by George Kitson was concluded in the afternoon. In the roadster class the champion mare was shown by Brendon Wallace. In the draft horse class the champion mare was shown by Lorne Crockett and the champion stallion by Donald Barbour. Lorne Crockett received the Canadian Tire Corporation and Holman awards for best horse in show. In the Holstein-Friesian cattle class there were one hundred and four entries. The champion-

special prizes for calves shown by boys and girls, and the Ralph Adams special for 4-H Club members will appear in the prize list. **FINE HANDICRAFT** A very fine display of handicraft was on exhibit. Hooked rugs and quilts were up to the usual high standard. There was an increase in the number of braided rugs and they were well made. A large number of cushions were shown. In crochet work the table cloths and spreads were outstanding and there were beautiful samples of similar work in runners, dollies, etc. One of the largest exhibitors in this class was Mrs. Sylvère F.J. Arsenault whose outstanding talent in handicraft, found expression in a woven bedspread, a chenille bedspread, a knitted bedspread, cushions, braided and hooked rugs. Of particular interest was her entry in the section for quilts of any material except cotton. Made of silk patches, hours of patient work by skilled fingers was evident in the outlining, feather stitching which appeared flawless. This is the first time Mrs. Arsenault has exhibited at Alberton and with 32 entries she captured 20 prizes. A scenic hooked rug made by Mrs. Elmer Hamill and one in animal design by Mrs. Fred Leard were samples of very fine hooking, while many of the others shown were of equally fine workmanship. In sewing there were well made women's and children's dresses and aprons. A beautiful specimen of smocking on a child's dress was the work of Mrs. Lorne McNeill. A television lamp in shellwork attracted much favorable comment and a necklace and ear rings of original design and of unusual material were samples of creative art displayed by Mrs. Leonard Barnett. There were a number of entries in the painting sections. Mrs. John Foley was awarded first prize for a winter scene in oil, while first place in water colors went to Eric Hardy, a youthful artist, for a lighthouse scene. A Canadian project map by Bonita Smith received first prize in the class for a novelty made by a girl of school age. Regrettably, there were few entries by boys and girls this year. The R.T. Holman prizes were awarded as follows: man's knitted sweater, Martha Meyer; crocheted cent piece, Mrs. Hugh McGregor; jewellery, Mrs. Leonard Barnett; collection of island views, Mrs. Ivan Hardy; collection of snaps of children, Mrs. H.E. Phillips. **FOOD DISPLAY** Luscious cakes and other toothsome goodies made each spectator at the food display cases wish to be a judge. Competition was keen and in many cases it was very difficult for Miss Theresa MacLeod, the judge, to decide the winners. Candy was replaced on the prize list this year after having been deleted for several years, and a number of entries were made. Alberton Lady Dies At 89

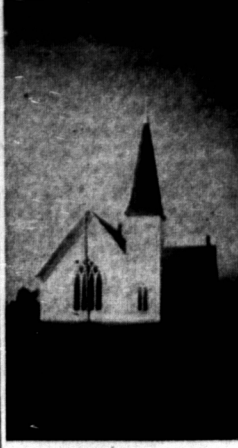
Early Wednesday morning, August 21, during the hours of sleep, death came to Mrs. J.E. C. Hunter of Alberton, who was a patient in the chronic care Centre in Summerside. The former Addie Rogers, daughter of the late Hon. Benjamin Rogers and Susan Hubbard Rogers, was born at Alberton January 1, 1868, and was a lifelong resident of the town. Sixty years ago she became the wife of Mr. Hunter who predeceased her eight years ago. Mrs. Hunter was the oldest member in full communion of the United Church of Canada in Alberton. As a member of the choir and for approximately forty years her rich alto voice contributed to the service of praise in the Old Dock Church. Assisted by the late Mrs. Andrew Wells, she organized the first Mission Band in the congregation. She was a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. Of a kind and friendly disposition, she enjoyed the love and respect of young and old. Her passing from this life removes another of the few remaining long-time residents of Alberton and also the last member of her generation of the Rogers family. She is survived by one daughter, Constance, of Boston; one son and daughter-in-law, Cedric and Lottie Hunter of Alberton, and one granddaughter, Lona Hunter, also of Alberton. ALBERTON LADY DIES AT 89

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Lived 85 Years On Family Farm

Following a long period of illness, Jesse Matthews, one of Alberton's longtime citizens, entered into rest Wednesday Morning, August 21, 1957. A son of the late Henry Matthews and the former Mary Jane Weeks, he was a grand nephew of the Gordons of Erromanga. His eighty-five years of life were spent on the farm where he was born. In 1912 he was married to Ethel Bell. They have one son, May- or Herbert Matthews, and two little grandchildren, Gordon and Barbara. Besides these, and his daughter-in-law, Mr. Matthews is survived by one sister, Mrs. Fred Clark (Susie) of Alberton, and two brothers, William in Irma, Alberta, and Fred in the Yukon. Mr. Matthews was a member of the United Church of Canada and while health permitted, it was his custom to be in the place of worship each Sunday. **EXHIBITIONS** Mr. Matthews was keenly interested in exhibitions. This interest dated back to more than sixty years ago when the first local exhibitions were held at a driving park on South Street. For many years he was an annual visitor to the Charlotte-town Exhibition where he learned much about the showing of livestock and vegetables. With this background he became a member of the Alberton Exhibition Association when it was first organized. In his quiet way he was one of the most enthusiastic promoters of what is now the Alberton-Prince County Exhibition. For many years he and Mrs. Matthews won many prizes for their excellent vegetables and Jersey cattle. He was a man of retiring disposition but one who enjoyed the respect of his townfolk and to many he was known as a good friend. He will be missed from his home and from that circle of friendship which he enjoyed for so many years. The funeral service will be at the family residence Friday afternoon at three o'clock.



THE PRESENT CHURCH North Bedeque United Church Special Service

North Bedeque United Church will be the scene of anniversary services next Sunday, August 25, commemorating the 131st anniversary of the induction of the first regular minister and the 66th of the dedication of the present church building. The Rev. John B. Hardie, M.A. Ph.D., Professor of Old Testament

at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax N.S. a well known and outstanding speaker, will be guest preacher. Late in 1825 the Bedeque area was created a separate charge of the Presbyterian church and called Rev. R. S. Patterson who was inducted on March 22nd 1826. He served for fifty-six years as minister of the North Bedeque charge until his death in 1882. The present church, the third in the history of the congregation, was completed and dedicated in 1891 during the ministry of the Rev. Wm. M. Lufts. The present minister is Rev. Grant S. Walls, B. Comm. B.D., Music for the morning service will be provided by a combined choir drawn from all points of the charge. In the evening the male choir organized by the Men's Club will lead the singing.
