Sinews of War

LONDON, Oct. 15.

Prince Alexander's yacht has arrived at Rostchuk with 7,000,000 silver five-franc pieces, and 17,000,000 cartridges from Russia.

The Rostchuk arsenal is making 600,000 cartridges daily.

It is reported that King Milan, of Serbia, informed the powers that he must either go to war or abdicate his throne, and he has decided to go to war. He has prepared a manifesto to his army, which will be issued to-morrow.

The Eastern Question

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 14.

The Sultan has determined to fight against a further dismemberment of Turkey and large bodies of troops are being rapidly concentrated on the frontier, at strategic points within easy striking distances of Bulgaria, Greece and Serbia. Troops, horses and field guns are being despatched to the front night and day.

A conspiracy has been discovered at the palace, which has led to the exile of Said Pasha, ex-Grand Vizier.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.

There were 62 deaths from small-pox in Montreal and suburbs yesterday.

County Judge McDonald has been appointed Revising Barrister for Centre and West Toronto.

Francis J. Dickens, Inspector of Mounted Police, has arrived in the city. It will be remembered that he figured prominently during the Northwest rebellion at Fort Pitt.

The population of Ottawa City increased by 2,066 during the past year, nearly eight per cent.

A Traitor Exiled.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 15.

Advices from Constantinople from the Russian embassy there, say that the Sultan has ordered ex-Sultan Mourad into exile in Arabia. Mourad, who has been restored to sanity, joined in a plot to regain the throne. The doctor attending him informed the Government, after warning the leader to desist from this scheme.

PARIS, Oct. 15.

A report that Austria is preparing to despatch 60,000 troops to Bosnia and Herzegovina has reached the foreign offices here.

VIENNA, Oct. 15.
