AN INSURGENT VICTORY.

De Gama's Forces Capture a Strong Position and Six Hundred Men. The London Times publishes the following despatch from Rio Janeiro, February 15th, via Montevideo, Feb. 20th: The return of the fight at Anaco last week...

Admiral de Gama is in no danger. The insurgents are in good spirits and ready to enter into another fight at any moment. Admiral de Gama states that he has sufficient provisions and ammunition for several weeks, and that he will make every endeavor to maintain his present position until the arrival of southern troops.

The gunners of the Nietheroy's dynamite gun have deserted, and the remainder of the crew has fled to Bahia. The engine of the Destroyer has broken down and they find much difficulty in obtaining crews. The Aquilone leaves on Sunday to intercept the Nietheroy.

Admiral Desterro state that the government's strong position in the state of Parana was taken on Friday after severe fighting, during which many were killed and wounded on both sides. The general commanding the government troops was wounded and 600 prisoners were taken.

BOSTON'S UNEMPLOYED.

A Delegation Literally Takes Possession of the State House. A delegation of unemployed in Boston called at the State House to see the governor on Tuesday afternoon.

The governor refused to see them, but sympathetically expressed the opinion that the legislature would respond in any practicable manner. After the governor retired, the crowd rushed into the building for the purpose of presenting the petition, Morrison I Swift, the leader, said that if the suggestions in the governor's speech were not carried out every man sitting on the floor would be cleaned out. The governor was informed of the remark. He came into the corridor and confronted Swift who said he meant they would clean them out by the ballot.

THE BOSTON RIOT.

According to the telegrams, the crisis which Macaulay foresees is imminent in at least some of the big cities of the States. The leader of a Boston mob, the other day proposed to "clean out every legislator" then in session in the State House if their demands for work and food were not satisfied. He was told that three thousand men filled the hall of the Legislature, shouting "Down with capital!" "Kill the police!" "Where are the cowardly lawmakers?" etc.

"I think I need all your good wishes in the present exigency. I doubt if any life insurance would cover me in an ordinary risk today. I came from strange and disorderly scenes. I stand here to-night to ask the support of the men of orderly minds in Massachusetts. (Cheers and applause.) Massachusetts means law. It makes my blood boil to find men who claim that Massachusetts laws are unfriendly and unjust to any. I want, and so do you, to give a fair play to every citizen of Massachusetts, and when I see disorderly persons thronging the streets, is not it a question which Massachusetts must answer? Yes, she has and will always answer and be true to her principles for equal rights. Therefore, I say, we have no reason for disorder. We simply want the business men to stand by us. Whenever the exigencies of the commonwealth call on me, I think, as long as life is left, I shall endeavor to be true to every interest of the commonwealth of Massachusetts."

The lesson to be drawn by our people from the want and misery which now prevail in the great cities of the States is that we ought to be contented with their lot as they make the best of it. A farmer on his farm, may be practically independent. He may, at all events, be sure of plenty to eat and drink, if only he will work. But in Boston, and New York, and Philadelphia, a man or woman, however capable and willing to work, is liable to be turned out of employment at any moment and cast upon the charity of the world to suffer and to starve.

MANITOBA SCHOOL DIFFICULTY.

Six questions were submitted to the Supreme Court in connection with this matter. The first question was whether or not the appeal of the Roman Catholic minority is admissible according to the statutes, and the second was to the same effect. In answer to this, the Chief Justice, Justices Taschereau and Gwynne said "no," and Justices Fournier and King said "yes." The third question was whether or not the decision of the Privy Council in the case was final. To this, the Chief Justice and all the others answered "no," except Fournier, who answered "yes." The fourth question was whether or not sub-section three of section ninety three of the British North America Act applies to Manitoba. The sub-section reads: "Where in any Province a system of separate or dissentient schools exists by law at the Union, or is thereafter established by the Legislature of the Province, an appeal shall lie to the Governor General in Council from any act or decision of any provincial authority affecting any right or privilege of the Protestant or Roman Catholic minority of the Queen's subject in relation to education."

The Chief Justice and Justices Taschereau and Gwynne answered "No," while Justices Fournier and King answered "Yes." The fifth question was whether or not the governor-general in council has any jurisdiction in the premises, or to grant a remedy as asked for by the Catholic minority. This question was answered in the same way. The sixth question was whether or not the minority have a right or privilege in relation to education, and if they have an appeal from the two acts complained of, which was also negatively by the Chief Justice and Justices Taschereau and Gwynne, and affirmed by Fournier and King. The Chief Justice is reported to have spoken strongly in favor of the province having a right to pass its own laws and against any imposition of any disability by the dominion parliament.

PARIS, Feb. 23. The police have arrested an anarchist named Kevilo, who is presumed to be one of the leaders of the bomb throwers operating in Paris.

HALIFAX, Feb. 23. The Liberal-Conservatives nominated W. A. Black, James Morrow and Dr. Thomas Wall as their candidates for Halifax County in the local elections.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Military reports from Sierra Leone are to the effect that the new magazine rifle used in the expedition against the Sofas surpasses the Martini in efficiency. KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 20.—At a meeting of the southern coal operators called here to-day to memorialize the senate against the free coal clause of the Wilson bill, the first speech made was in favor of free coal. It was delivered by C. M. Woodbury, receiver of the Mine Mines of Middleborough, Ky. The sentiment of the meeting, however, is against free coal.

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—The First Presbyterian church of this city is much exercised over the teaching of the Chinese in Sunday school by the young women of the parish. A determined effort was made by the anti-Chinese element in the society to stop the practice. Danger of matrimonial alliance between teachers and pupils is the cause of the trouble.

MADRID, Feb. 20.—The Minister of Foreign Affairs has received a cable message from the Spanish Minister at Washington saying that the United States Government has admitted the principle of the Spanish claim for damages to Spanish subjects who suffered during the Florida war. The amount of the claims is said to be about \$100,000.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The Spanish claims referred to are identified with the earliest existence of the Government. The claims arose through an invasion of Florida by the Americans, and about the beginning of this century, when Florida was a Spanish province. The troops seized or destroyed some personal property of the Spaniards, who after the cession of Florida took up their residence in Cuba, declining to give allegiance to the new flag. In the treaty of 1818, entered between Spain and the United States, articles were included providing for the settlement of these damages.

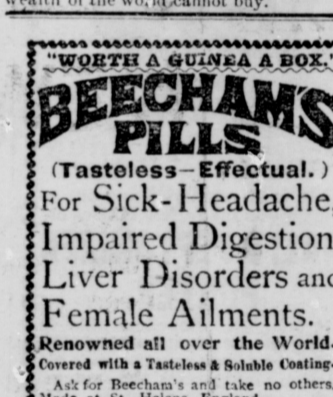
