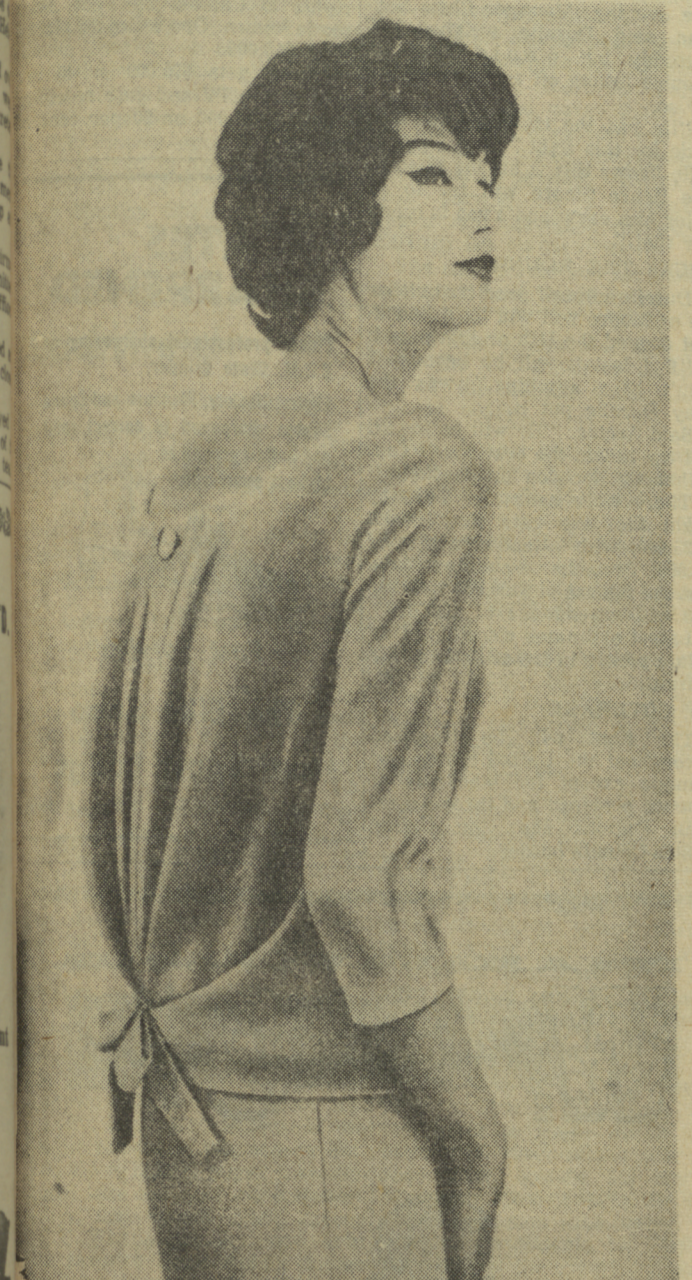

Cinnamon-Cider Jelly To Give For Christmas

The Annual Craftsman's fair held last summer in Lacona, N.H., was a beautiful and intriguing display, reports our assistant, Helen Bennett, who vacationed in New Hampshire.

Three floors of exhibits showed hooked and braided rugs; hand-woven articles in lovely colors; hand-turned wooden salad bowls and carved dishes; ceramics, pottery and paintings designed by artisans schooled at the University of New Hampshire, and fine artisans throughout the country.

The Fair was sponsored by the League of New Hampshire Arts and Crafts, for the benefit of craftsmen and the delight of tourists and to help rehabilitation programs for the handicapped and educational, work among the aged.

Cooking was represented among the other arts with a fine display of homemade candies, salad dressings and the most divine-looking and tasting cinnamon-cider jelly. It is wonderful on toast and would make such a delightful rose-red Christmas gift, Helen suggested.

The Chef and I agreed and went right into action in the test-kitchen. We worked out a recipe, not only for cinnamon-cider jelly,

but for a brand-new apple relish. All measurements are level.

Cinnamon-Cider Jelly: Especially good with cream cheese on toast or English muffins.

Measure 4 c. sweet apple cider into a 5 to 6 qt. saucepan. Stir in 7/8 c. granulated sugar and 2 tbs. red cinnamon candies.

Place over high heat. Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Add 1 bottle liquid fruit pectin. Bring to a full rolling boil.

Remove from heat. Skim off any foam with a metal spoon. Pour jelly quickly into sterilized glasses. Cover at once with 1/8 in. hot paraffin.

Makes about 11 medium-size glasses, or 5 1/2 lbs. jelly.

Apple Relish: Delightful with smoked ham, pork or poultry. First prepare apples as follows: Wash, core and grind 3 lbs. fully ripe cooking apples. Measure 4 c. into a 5 to 6 qt. saucepan. Add 6 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1/2 c. cider vinegar, 1/2 c. fine raisins and 1/4 c. cinnamon candies.

Place over high heat. Bring to a full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 min.

Remove from heat. At once stir in 1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 min. with a metal spoon, to cool slightly and prevent fruit from floating.

Ladle quickly into sterilized jars or glasses. Cover at once with 1/8 in. hot paraffin.

If jars are used, seal. If jelly glasses have metal tops, adjust them.

Makes about 10 medium glasses, or 5 lbs. relish.
