Local and Other Items.

STORM COMING.—A storm warning was received this forenoon, predicting a fresh to a heavy gale, at first from an easterly direction, shifting to south-southwest.

OYSTER SUPPER.—The Pioneer reports that the Salvation Army Oyster Supper at Summerside, on Thursday evening, was fairly successful, some \$30 or \$40 being realized.

METHODIST PULPIT EXCHANGE.—Rev. John Read preached yesterday in Summerside, and Rev. G. C. Palmer, of that town, occupied the pulpit of the Prince St. Church, last evening.

THE RECORD BROKEN.—The steamer Umbria has again broken her record on the last trip from New York to Queenstown. She made the trip in the remarkable short time of 6 days, 2 hours and 45 minutes, beating all previous records by above two hours.

THE AMERICAN NAVY.—The new American navy, when completed, will consist of 22 vessels, ranging from the armored cruiser Maine, with 444 men, down to a first-class torpedo boat, carrying 4 officers and 18 men. There will be 5,785 men on board the 22 vessels—599 officers and 5,286 sailors and marines.

TOO MUCH MARRIED.—A gross case of bigamy is reported from Cornwallis, Ont. Silas E. Seymour, alias Wortman, alias S. E. Shaver, who represented himself as a traveller for T. S. Price, jeweller, of Montreal, made the acquaintance of Nellie Fish and invited her to a ball twelve miles distant. They did not return till the next day, and the girl was severely blamed by her father. Last Thursday night the pair were married at the Methodist parsonage by Rev. Mr. Reynolds. They left for Morrisburg, where the man procured a leg from a lively stable. It has since been ascertained that Seymour has been married five times and that four of his wives are living.

REVIVAL AT MARGATE.—Rev. C. W. Hamilton writes from Margate, P. E. I., to the Wesleyan: "Gracious seasons still continue. The covenant service will be long remembered; none of the large congregation left till all was over. Up to date 40 persons have been received on trial. There are several others who have been saved who have not yet come forward for membership. A considerable number go to other churches. The week of prayer just closing has been a glorious time—it was never so seen here before. Presbyterians, Episcopalians and Methodists are so united that you could not tell them apart. Crowded churches and best influences prevailed. Young ladies prayer meeting has been organized."

A HARD WINTER.—An Augusta, Me., despatch says:—Hon. Lambert Sands, of Sebec, one of the presidential electors, comes from the centre of the lumbering region. In conversation with the Press correspondent, he said recently: "The present open winter will inflict thousands of dollars worth of damage on the lumbermen of Maine. There are hundreds of men employed in the Piscataquis region. Previous to these rains they have done very little. Some of them have come out—men, teams and all. Others are so far north that they cannot get out well, and their teams are in the woods eating their heads off. The misfortune to the lumbering affects all branches of business, resulting in a general dullness. Everyone in our region is therefore impatient of the beautiful weather which so pleases the people hereabouts."

NEW STEAMER.—Mr. W. W. Clarke has received the stock list of the new steamer to replace the M. A. Starr next season which can be seen at his office by persons desirous of investing. The capital stock will be \$75,000 in 750 shares of \$100 each. The stock has been rapidly taken up in Halifax, \$40,000 having been subscribed up to date. Mr. Clarke informs us that his intentions are not to sell any more than \$12,000 on the Island—\$2000 of which sum has already been taken. Messrs. Pickford & Black are the Halifax agents. The new steamer will be built of iron, sheathed with green-heart, steaming not less than twelve knots an hour. She will be furnished in first-class style throughout and will have accommodations for about fifty passengers. It is expected that Captain Fraser, at present of the Coburn, will be her commander. In addition to the route of the Starr the new steamer will call at Souris each trip, thus affording our friends at that place excellent facilities for shipping. Mr. Clarke will be the steamer's agent at this port.

ANOTHER ROBBERY.—Some person entered the basement of Knight's bakery, on Kent Street, during Saturday night and stole therefrom several loaves of bread. An entrance was effected through an outside hatch. The thief, after getting inside, tried to force his way into the shop, but could not do so.

THE COLD SNAP.—Between eight o'clock on Saturday evening and eight o'clock on Sunday morning, the thermometer fell from 34 to 3 above zero, and the wind blew at the rate of 22 miles an hour. During Sunday the thermometer registered 10 above; last night it fell to four above, and this morning 9 above was recorded. Between Sunday morning and this morning the wind moderated to 4 miles an hour.

MORE GLASS BROKEN.—One of the large plate-glass panes in the door of Messrs. Ritchie Bros., store on Lower Queen Street, was broken about eleven o'clock on Saturday night. The shutters had been put up as usual when closing the store for the night and the supposition is that some person took off one of the shutters and threw it through the window. It is a pity that an example cannot be made of the guilty person.
