Lobster Catches Reported Good

Warren Farrar, district fisheries officer, Canada Department of Fisheries, predicts a good catch for Island lobster fishermen this season.

Catches along the North shore have been good for the most part with some really good hauls. The average was running a pound to one and one-quarter, or one and one-half pounds, per trap in the earlier part of the season at most North shore harbors, though that had slacked off last week in bad weather to perhaps closer to three-quarter pounds per trap, Mr. Farrar said.

The present weather should result in the catch improving again, it was observed.

One of two boats at Alberton must be hovering around the 10,000-pound mark, said the district officer. But, he explained, these would be large, three-man boats, fishing perhaps 800 to 1,000 traps.

DIDN'T KNOW COST

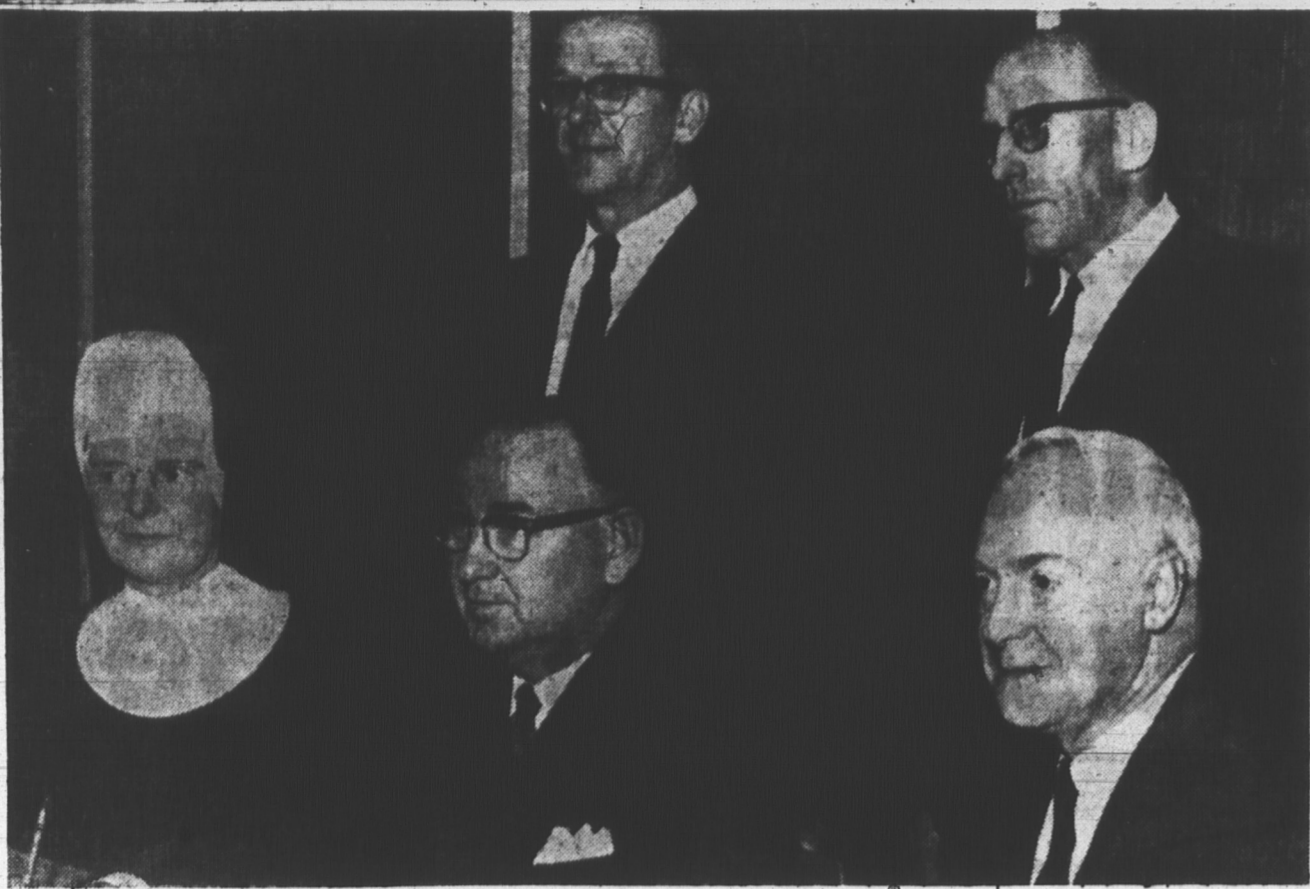

The P.E.I. Regiment will be under command of Major W.S. Veale; 5 Signal Regiment will be commanded by Lt. Col. H.R. Hennessey; and 5 Medical Company will be under Lt. Col. A.L. Roberts. P.E.I. R Squadron from Montague and Summerside will arrive at Memorial Field at 7 pm., and a platoon of student militia will augment the ranks of the P.E.I. R. The band of the P.E.I. R will be commanded by Lt. C.E. MacGregor.

The inspection proper will include a review of all ranks of the three units and band, a march-past in column-of-rouls, and advance in review order, and unit demonstrations.

St. Peter's Library To Resume Operation

The St. Peter's Bay branch of the Prince Edward Island Libraries, completely wiped out by a major fire three weeks ago, will resume operations today in temporary quarters located in the St. Peter's South elementary school.

Earlier this week, staff members from library headquarters at Charlottetown moved approximately 1,400 books into the new location, and the librarian, Mrs. Mary MacIsaac, will be back at her desk this afternoon.

The library hours in the new location have been slightly altered to conform with school schedules. They are as follows: Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, 2:30 to 6:30; Friday, from 6:00 to 9 p.m.; Saturday, from 2 to 5 p.m.

FIFTH BUSIEST

The recently destroyed library at St. Peter's was one of the best-appointed branches in the province, and at the time of the disaster, circulation had reached an all-time high of 1,184 books for one month, making it the fifth busiest library in the province.

CNR Conductor Makes Last Run

Julian I. Herring, a member of the staff of the Canadian National Railway on Prince Edward Island, since 1922, retired yesterday afternoon. His last run was on train No. 1615 from Borden which came to rest in the Charlottetown Station at about 5:15 yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Herring began his career on the railway on September 7, 1922 as a trainman. He was promoting he has held ever since. He was chairman of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen on P.E.I. from 1952 to 1962.

He has seen the railway on the Island develop and was a member of the train which made the first trip west of Summerside on standard gauge rails. He has served on all the lines in the Island.

In 193 Mr. Herring loaded the first freight train onto the S.S. Charlottetown on her maiden voyage between Borden and Cape Tormentine and he was a passenger on her when she sank in 1941 on her way to drydock.

County Court Fines Driver

In Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday Kenneth E. Shaw West Royalty, was fined \$15 and costs or five days on a charge of driving without due care and attention. Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided.

The charge of driving while his licence was suspended formerly laid against James Harry Graham, Gaspereaux, was withdrawn and in its place a charge of driving without a valid licence was laid against the accused. He was fined \$10 and costs or five days. Counsel for the accused was Kenneth MacDonald.

Ernest William Darby, Parkdale, pleaded not guilty to a charge of failing to stop after an accident. He also pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while impaired. He was remanded to June 20 on both charges with bail to stand. Counsel for the accused was Gordon Tweedy.

Governments Blamed For Copper Chaos

His government will immediately pay old age pensions of \$100 and more per month when there is a need to, Premier Walter R. Shaw announced yesterday. These payments will be made without a means test.

The announcement was made following a statement in the House of Commons Tuesday evening by Allan MacEachen, minister of national health and welfare, that the federal government will pay half of such assistance retroactive to April 1, 1966.
