Insurance Rates.

The fact that underwriters in England have ordered an addition of fifty per cent to the rate of insurance throughout the Maritime Provinces must cause some changes when policies are renewed. It is probable that an increased amount will be taken in the local companies and those of the Canadian and American companies doing business in this city.

The Letter Thief.

It is currently reported to-day that the dismissed messenger of the Post Office Department has been permitted to escape from the city. These who have lost their money in the Post Office are now without any recourse whatever. The robberies have extended over a year, many hundreds of letters have been misappropriated, and hundreds of thousands of dollars stolen.

Notes and Comments.

There is a strong feeling at Washington in favor of retaining the twenty day quarantine against steamer passengers as a means of restricting immigration. The New York Board of Trade and Transportation has approved of a resolution in favor of prohibiting immigration altogether for three years.

The Canadian Illustrated for November contains a group of Canadian poets in miniature. Mr. J. Hunter Duvar occupies a prominent place. The following poetical tribute is paid to him:

Lo, in the East a regal star Illumes the heavens; hail, Duvar! The Garden of the Gulf adorning; No petty satellite art thou; With borrowed light upon thy brow; Shine on, and cheer our Nation's morning.

Mr. McLeod, the Chief Superintendent of Education, has received, unsolicited, several testimonials from the highest sources as to the value of his recent publication, "Problems in Arithmetic." Among these we are permitted to mention the Hon. R. Harcourt, Provincial Treasurer and acting Minister of Education in Ontario, and Dr. Morrison, Rector of St. Dunstan's College. We have no doubt that the book will be widely circulated throughout Canada.

The report on the recruiting of the British army during the first seven months of this year, which has just been issued by the inspector general of recruiting, is said to afford military men very considerable satisfaction. Considering the very unsatisfactory state of affairs in this regard in late years, the satisfaction is mostly comparative. During the first seven months of this year, 23,067 recruits were raised, against 19,059 during the same period of 1891. The returns show that where on August 1, 1891, there was a deficiency in the establishment of the British army of 54,966 non-commissioned officers and men, the deficiency on August 1 of this year was only 21,888. But the gain in the infantry of the line, where the deficiency is always greatest, is only 387. This is no improvement at all, for the infantry of the line is still 26,377 men below its establishment. Other parts of the service are greatly in excess of their establishment. This would seem to show that men cannot be had in the places they are most wanted. They will join the crack regiments, but will not join the infantry.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Hill worked hard this year to elect Cleveland in the expectation that 1896 would see the result in the removal of our greatly esteemed United States Consul—I. C. The London Globe puts it that in the United States high protection has subsidized manufacturers at the expense of agriculturists, while in Great Britain, it holds the same same service has been done for the same class and at the same expense, but free trade. The moral seems to be that the greatest good to the greatest number is to be found in a moderate protection, such as Canada has adopted, for instance.

One of the remarkable results of the Presidential election is the successful candidate for the third time of Mr. W. E. Russell for the governorship of Massachusetts. He is a Democrat in a firmly Republican state. He has headed the polls, though his colleagues for the lieutenant governorship and the majority of the Legislature and state officers elected were Republicans. His success is a striking evidence of the confidence a man at once strong, clean and of business capacity can win in a politically hostile country. Such men are the best of independents.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that as the British lion looked at his tail yesterday he was no doubt pleased to note that the marks on that important appendage made by the Yankee twister corresponded exactly with those on the hands of the politicians who were hanging on to the side of the throne to keep their heads out of the soup. The last two weeks of the campaign were marked by the wildest and silliest appeals to Irish prejudice on the part of the Republican managers and news papers to vote against Cleveland's British policy. It is not a little creditable to the sense of the Irish people that in New York city, the locality where these appeals were more frequently made, the party that used them received its worst thrashing.

Montreal Gazette: Five years ago, when Mr. Cleveland was President, a treaty relating to the Atlantic fisheries was entered into, in modification of the treaty of 1818, and at the threshold of the negotiations Sir Charles Tupper proposed, on behalf of Canada, that the whole question of the commercial interests of the two countries should be taken up, and the settlement made upon the basis of a broad reciprocity of free trade. Mr. Bayard, then Secretary of State, declined to entertain the proposal on the ground that it was contrary to democratic doctrine to usurp the control of the tariff which belonged to the House of Representatives, and in his message to the Senate recommending the ratification of the Fisheries treaty of 1888 Mr. Cleveland said: "The treaty now submitted contains no provisions affecting tariff duties, and it was considered more expedient to allow any change in the revenue laws of the United States to be made by the ordinary exercise of legislative will, and in promotion of the public interest." The policy now enunciated may be expected to govern Mr. Cleveland's policy in the next four years, and we cannot, therefore, anticipate the conclusions of a reciprocal treaty of trade between the two countries. But what we may with a good deal of confidence count upon is the modification of tariffs in the interest of freer commercial relations. Mr. Cleveland is on record as favoring friendly relations.

To sum up, while we do not believe that a general treaty of trade can be arranged between Canada and the United States under a Democrat rule, we have strong hope that the commercial relations of the two countries will become more intimate and more friendly under the fiscal legislation of the next four years, and we are sure that any overture in this direction on the part of our neighbors will receive a cordial response from the Dominion authorities.

MARINE DISASTERS.

VESSELS WRECKED.

A Chicken-hearted Crew.

LONDON, Nov. 14. The steam tug Scorer, which left Lythorn on the Irish Sea, Oct. 25th, on a short voyage, carrying three passengers and a crew of six, is believed to have foundered during recent gales.

St. John, Nov. 14. The schooner Arbutus, from Sydney for Annapolis, is wrecked on the old proprietor shoals off Gannet Rock, at the mouth of the Bay of Fundy. The crew, except Hiram Conrad who was lost, has been taken to St. John.

HALIFAX, Nov. 14. The schooner James Arthur, from St. John's, N.S.I., Oct. 17, for Sydney, has not been heard from, and fears are entertained that she is lost.

On Saturday afternoon the crew of the Cape Ann fishing schooner Knight Templar, was found drifting in a boat off this harbor and brought into port by a pilot boat. The captain stated that his vessel had been run into and was sinking when the crew abandoned her. A tug went out to look for the Knight Templar and picked her up practically undamaged.

Bloody Sunday Anniversary.

Popular Demonstration in London.

The Cry of the Destitute

LONDON, Nov. 14. Trafalgar Square was yesterday the anniversary of the "Bloody Sunday" scene. A great popular demonstration was held in celebration of the restoration by the Liberal Government of the right to hold public meetings in the Square, and give voice to the demands of the unemployed poor upon the Government and local bodies to start all means of relieving the existing destitution. The resolutions were declared carried, although owing to the hubbub the words could not be heard beyond the platform.

Press Repression

MONTREAL, Nov. 14. A mandament was read in the Catholic churches yesterday excommunicating the Canada Review and L'Echo, of Two Mountains, for recent outspoken comments on clerical scandals. The faithful are forbidden to read either journal.

Embezzler Sentenced.

St. John, Nov. 14. Albert A. Dodge, I. C. R. freight cashier, charged with embezzlement, on pleading "guilty" was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

General Telegraphic News.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—The half yearly statement of the Bank of Montreal issued today shows a 3 per cent. dividend payable December 1, equal to \$600,000, and the balance of profit and loss to be \$569,959.

VIENNA, Nov. 11.—A mill collapsed in Opatov, Moravia, yesterday shortly before the hands were to leave for the night. The men in the basement and on the ground floor ran out. The men and girls above, started down stairs but the stairs collapsed. About 50 persons were caught in the bricks and broken timber. It is supposed 35 or 49 were killed. The dead bodies of 20 were removed. The mill was dimly built. The operation of heavy machinery on the second floor is believed to have caused the collapse. The police will arrest the builder.

LONDON, November 11.—A despatch from St. Petersburg says a woman in the small district of Bessarabi, who had been given shelter by a peasant, killed two young children of the latter, and ate the flesh of one during the mother's absence from the house. The mother upon returning became a raving maniac. The cannibal was arrested after a most desperate struggle.

CHICAGO, November 11.—The World's fair directors today adopted a resolution favoring the opening of the world's fair gates on Sunday, provided the machinery is not run.

LONDON, November 11.—Watson, the condemned murderer Meill's counsel, has moved for a further respite, on the ground that he expects more affidavits from America bearing on the prisoner's insanity. It is, however, expected that the law will take its course, and that Neill or Cream will be executed next Tuesday.
