

Disorderly Conduct Results in \$25 Fine

Charged with disorderly conduct, Richard MacLennan of Charlottetown was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days when he appeared yesterday before Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC. in city police court.

Horace Ford, Charlottetown charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated, was remanded until this morning, with bail to stand. Two crown witnesses were heard: Constable William Dossan of the Charlottetown RCMP and Constable Donald Trainor of the Charlottetown City Police. Ford is represented by John Holmes, and has pleaded not guilty.

Frank Henley, Charlottetown, was remanded to Jan. 6 on a charge of assault.

Paul Clarke, Parkdale, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days for speeding. He was clocked doing 30 m.p.h. on Euston Street, a 20 m.p.h. zone.

Stirling MacLeod, Charlottetown, was fined \$25 and costs or five days for speeding on Elm Avenue, a 20 mile zone at 35 m.p.h.

Ralph Chandler, Charlottetown, charged with being drunk and disorderly pleaded guilty and was remanded to Jan. 6.

Two men were fined \$10 and costs or five days each for failing to stop at red traffic lights.

One man was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for being in a possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence.

Two men were each sentenced to 20 days on charges of being drunk and incapable while a third facing a similar charge was committed to River side Hospital for treatment.

Premier Shaw Issues New Year's Message

Presenting his annual New Year's message, Premier Walter R. Shaw has extended to the citizens of the province, best wishes for happiness and prosperity in the days ahead.

Following is the text of the premier's message.

"As time heralds in a New Year, the hearts of our people are filled with sentiments of peace and goodwill. It is in this spirit that I extend to our citizens one and all best wishes for happiness and prosperity in the days ahead.

"This is a time when we review the record of the past year and assess its blessings and accomplishments, and look forward with our plans for the year opening before us. It is true that tragedy, sorrow and disappointment have visited some homes, and my deepest sympathy goes out to the afflicted. Generally speaking, however, the citizens of our province have many reasons for thanksgiving. A Divine Providence has blessed us with a season of pleasant days and rare island attractiveness, bountiful harvest on land and sea, and peace among men.

EXPANSION NOTED

"Under constructive planning there has been a gratifying expansion in the resources of the Province. Small and large projects of importance to our economy have been launched, and the present program provides for still greater development in the future. Splendid co-operation on the part of the people has revealed new opportunities and challenging prospects. Careful surveys are now underway over wide sections of the Province; and, based on these surveys, plans will be laid for further expansion.

"Looking forward, our thoughts are concerned with the activities associated with the 100th anniversary of the meeting held in Charlottetown in 1864 of the Fathers of Confederation. In every part of Prince Edward Island, plans are being formulated to make this great Canadian event of unusual significance. Great preparations are being made to entertain and accommodate the large numbers who will visit our province. An enthusiastic welcome awaits all.

"From every aspect, the year just should be a very happy, interesting and prosperous year. I urge all our citizens, young and old, to give of their best in beautifying our province, developing our resources, extending hospitality to the strangers who will visit us, and in building peace, goodwill and prosperity in the year ahead."

Youth Elects Summary Trial On Break And Entry Charge

Douglas Gordon Mairhead, 18, Nine Mile Creek, was arraigned on a charge of break, entry and theft and elected trial by magistrate, when he appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC. in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday.

He was remanded to Jan. 3.

Mairhead is charged with breaking and entering a New Dominion service station and stealing \$2.70 in pennies and a \$45.50 worth of cigarettes.

RCMP officers in court said that four to five others were involved in the break.

Gary Laurence Buckl, Mermaid, charged with break and entering and theft of 32 pecks of upgraded oysters and four oyster crates, was remanded to Jan. 6 because his counsel was not in court.

CNR To Probe Complaints

Premier Walter R. Shaw, received assurance from the Canadian National Railways, Montreal, yesterday that complaints by Island dealers and shippers that improperly insulated railway cars are being supplied thus damaging potato exports, will be investigated.

Shippers and dealers said last week the frost damage to potatoes occurred because the railway, in some cases, was using American cars that are more prone to freezing conditions than the Canadian-built cars.

TO INSPECT CARS

"The CNR is looking into the situation," Premier Shaw said, "and will inspect all cars to see that they are properly equipped to carry potatoes. When this is done, it is expected that the situation will be eased."

Premier Shaw pointed out that the railway does not have enough Canadian-built cars to "go around from Vancouver to Halifax, as well as interchange with American lines. Thus, some American cars have to be used."

Potato shipments from this province in the current crop year are away ahead of last year, with 2,846 carloads shipped from Aug. 1 to Dec. 15, compared to 1,830 carloads shipped in the same period last year.

One government official said "the railway deserves a lot of credit in arranging these extra cars for Prince Edward Island and for moving them so speedily."


