The minister stated that he thought every farmer in the Province should belong to the Provincial Federation of Agriculture so that, when the Federation speaks, it speaks for all the farmers of the province.

Maritime Redevelopment Is Urged By Prime Minister

TORONTO (CP) — Economic redevelopment of the Atlantic provinces deserves consideration, Prime Minister St. Laurent said. Mr. St. Laurent was discussing unemployment in an address before the first convention of the Canadian Labor Congress on April 24. "In some areas," he said, "particularly in the Atlantic provinces, efforts on what we might call economic redevelopment seem to be desirable." "During this past year in meetings with provincial governments, I have been impressed with the readiness of representatives from other parts of the country to recognize that special measures should perhaps be taken to improve the economy of the Atlantic provinces. Their merits and is receiving attention from many of us. However the initiative and the ideas, the energies and determination to accomplish this redevelopment cannot originate in other parts of the Atlantic area itself. "It will then be for us elsewhere to co-operate and help to make such ideas and efforts fruitful in providing better opportunities for workers in those areas," he said.

Local APEC Vice-President Is Enthusiastic

"It is very encouraging to read, from the Prime Minister's address to the Canadian Congress of Labor, that the efforts of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, and others, toward the development of the Atlantic area are being recognized across Canada," Keith MacKinnon, P. E. Island vice-president of the APEC said Friday night. "The Provincial Governments of the four Atlantic provinces are doing everything possible to hasten this development. However, it is as the Prime Minister says, that ideas, initiative, energies and determination must come from the people themselves. "In APEC we have the means of making this development possible, but we need the support, moral, physical and financial of everyone in the area, business and professional men, educationists, and those engaged in the primary industries. We need to hire more staff for research and development, and the promotion of new industries. Just now we are conducting an extensive membership campaign to promote new interest and funds for this work. We need the support of everyone. Let us show the rest of Canada that we can do it."

United States Suspicious Of Red Offer On Arms To Mideast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States reacted with more suspicion than hope Friday to Russia's reported readiness to support a United Nations embargo on arms shipments to the Middle East. The Soviet attitude expressed by Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev at a London press conference had all the earmarks of a trap designed to cut off United States and British military support for anti-Communist countries in the strategic Middle East. In essence, it looks like a Soviet device for breaking up the Baghdad Pact by saying to the United States and Britain this is the Moscow price for halting Communist arms shipments to Egypt. If that is the Russian plan, highly-placed authorities said here Friday, the United States would have no part of it. They declared the U. S. would not try to settle one price—that of Soviet bloc arms shipments to Egypt—by creating another, meaning to weaken over-all resistance in the region to Soviet pressures.

Intentions Uncertain

What Russia's real intentions in the Middle East are no policy-maker here seems to be sure. The Russians may genuinely want the international good will which they would get from promoting Middle East peace. They may want to keep the Middle East hot boiling but take no risk of its boiling over into war. The Russians may genuinely want the international good will in exchange for an end to Western defence efforts there. It is in this latter possibility that American officials are centring their attention.

DEFINITION NEEDED

Russia has repeatedly denounced the Baghdad Pact as well as the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance.
