Richardson Hats Greaves To Grab Canadian Crown

GLACIER BAY, N.S. (CP)—Young Blair Richardson, of South Bay, N.S., battered Will Greaves of Edmonton for more than seven rounds Saturday night to win the Canadian middleweight title.

Richardson used a crisp left jab and followup right crosses to down the champion on three occasions, once in the seventh and twice in the eighth before the Greaves protested to the one-sided affair at 23 seconds of the eighth round with the Greaves in the center of the ring.

It was the second meeting between the two fighters in their first encounter July 28, a Martine record crowd of 6,500 jammed Glacier Bay Miners' Forum and paid a net gate of \$16,000 to see Greaves score a knockout in the fifth of a 12-round championship bout.

Greaves entered the ring a 7-5 favorite.

The veteran of 40 pro fights, many with ranking world titles, was completely outclassed by the 22-year-old Cape Bretoner. The champ was stunned in every round by the hard-hitting challenger and appeared prostrate and bewildered on the third round on.

The meeting went on record as endorsing the MAHA's co-operation with the newly organized Maritime Hockey Referees Association.
