OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—(CP)—The External Affairs Department said in a statement today a double security check has given a "clean bill of health" to E. H. Norman, 43, acting chief of Canada's delegation to the United Nations.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(CP)—A new British-led project to defend and stabilize the troubled Middle East was reported today. Informed officials said Britain has won American and French backing for a Middle Eastern defence system tied to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

MONTREAL, Aug. 9.—(CP)—Fred Rose, one-time parliamentarian imprisoned in 1947 as key figure in an espionage ring which divulged Canada's defence secrets to Russia, left penitentiary a free man today.
