Separation Deal Blows

MONTREAL (CP)—Maurice Lamontagne, president of the Privy Council, criticized Quebec's political, labor and education leaders Sunday for not warning French-speaking Canadians of the consequences of separatism.

"It is all right to speak about liberation in emotional terms," he said, "but French-Canadians have a right to expect not only this kind of appeal but also a complete picture of what would result from this drastic change (separatism)."

Lamontagne, the federal cabinet minister responsible for federal-provincial relations and separatism,

He made his remarks in a 15-minute speech to the Eastern region conference of the Canadian Jewish Congress and a 20-minute question period that followed.

He said the separation of Quebec from Canada would result in a break-up of the Canadian Union of the Atlantic provinces and the United Provinces, British Columbia and the Prairie provinces would follow suit then Ontario would have no choice but to join the U.S.

"I maintain that eventually Quebec and French Canada would also have to join the U.S.," he said.

Some 700 delegates attending the conference appealed to Lamontagne to end discrimination against Jews in the Soviet Union and to permit them to leave the country freely.

A TCA spokesman said heavy pieces of wreckage, such as the engine, may be found buried as deep as 30 feet in the nearby woods.

BULLDOZERS USED

Bulldozers began digging a deep trench around the wreckage made by the plume of the plane. Workers then will be able to get at the wreckage from the sides instead of from the front.

Minute examination of the ground in the area—now snow-covered—has continued.

Jewelry and other personal belongings found have led so far to the identification of the remains of 12 victims.

Dr. Jean-Louis Talon, district registrar, said relatives of the victims will be advised they can visit the morgue, if they wish, for the purpose of trying to establish identifications.

The morgue is in a barracks building and a nearby army camp.

Dr. Talon said it is the relatives' right to take away the remains for private burial if they wish, he said.

Otherwise, he will ask permission for a mass burial somewhere near the site.
