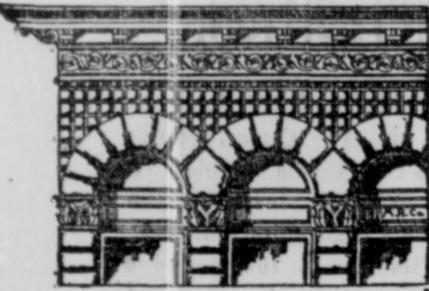

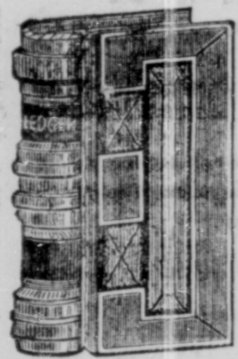

DAIRYMEN'S BOARD OF TRADE.

Summary of the Business Transacted Last Season

The Board was organized on June 13. Charles Taper was elected President, Robert Jenkins, Vice President, and Alfred E. Dewar, Secretary-Treasurer. The first meeting for the sale of cheese was held on July 4th. The officers were instructed to procure cables and other information for the use of the Board. The cables were received from Liverpool, but on account of the uncertainty an arrangement was made with the Trade Bulletin of Montreal, to furnish on Friday a cable from London, England, the state of the Montreal market, and the price paid at Brockville on the previous day, for two dollars per message, the Board to pay transmission from Montreal. Eleven meetings were held and the total number of cheese boarded was 31,381, while the number sold on the board was 13,263. The number sold in July was 3901, average price 8.452c; in August 3437, average price 9.48c; in September 1587, average price 11.63c; in October 2305, average price 11.40c; in November 2033, average price 10.13-16c.

The average price for the season was 9.973c.

The highest price paid on the Board was 11.78c; on September 29th.

The number of factories that boarded cheese was 22.

CONCERT AT MOUNT STEWART

The concert and athletic show given in the I O F Hall by the Y M G Association on Thursday evening the 15th instant, was a great success. The hall was packed to the entrance, and standing room was at a premium. Somewhere in the vicinity of three hundred people attended, and by the storm of applause accorded each number on the programme, I can unhesitatingly say that it was heartily enjoyed. Mr. H. Coffin acted as chairman, and excellent order prevailed. The programme consisted of a pleasing variety, being musical, literary and athletic. The solo by J D McIntyre was well rendered and elicited much applause, as was also the duet by the Misses McAulay and McGillivray. Mr. A McAulay, of Tracadie, brought down the house with "Pat Casey of Tammany Hall," and being encored he gave a Gaelic song producing a similar effect. The dialogues and readings were presented in a particularly pleasing manner. It is not necessary to particularize as each part was ably handled. The step dancing by J J McKenna, Jr, was more than enjoyed, being encored three times. "Litt e Jaak," as he is jocularly called, is a gem on the stage. The stump speech by Edwin Griffin, on "Woman's Rights," almost paralyzed the audience. The exhibition of the chest-drill by the junior members of the association was performed in a praiseworthy manner—reflecting much credit on their esteemed teacher, Mr R Pigott. Messrs Bambrick and Down headed their trambourines in a manner calculated to evoke rounds of applause. The musical part of the programme was under the direction of Messrs Barrett and Affleck, and there was nothing lacking in that part of the entertainment. The acting on the parallels brought down the house in right style. Mr J McAskill acted the clown—and Jaak is not like a one that can't do it. I am sure the audience must have been badly shook up as was evidenced by the roars of laughter during the performance. The managing committee, Messrs Coffin, McAskill and Douglas, are to be congratulated on making their first concert such a decided success. The proceeds amounted to twenty-five dollars, which will go towards equipping the gymnasium. The association meets twice a week, Tuesdays and Saturdays, at 7 o'clock p.m., when our genial secretary-treasurer, Mr McAskill, will be more than pleased to enroll members after paying the initiation fee of ten cents.
