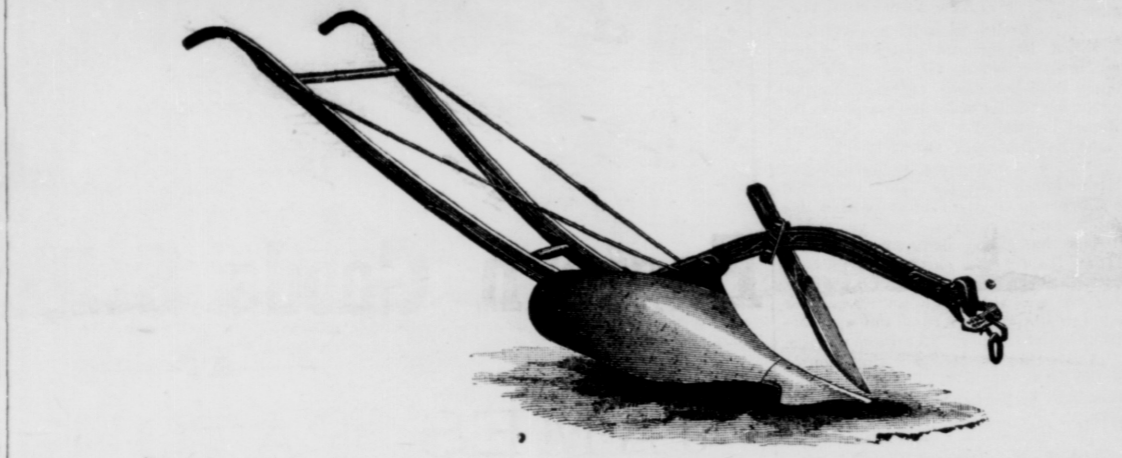

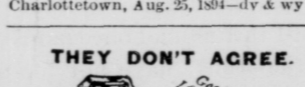

FARMERS AND THE TARIFF.

The Halifax Herald recently had a discussion with one of its contemporaries upon farmers' protection, and the other day had the following to say. We commend its remarks to the thoughtful perusal of our readers:—

"Our neighbor asserts that protection is injurious to farmers. How does it prove it? It does not attempt to prove it. It merely says there is no dispute about it, but nobody would be silly enough to assert it. Who are they who assert it? Not the farmers themselves, and they are the people who understand and are interested in the matter. When the tariff revision was brought down, it was found that the new agricultural schedule afforded slightly less protection on an item or two than was afforded by the old tariff.

What was the result? The farmers and those who undertook to act specially for their interests, firmly agitated for reduction of the farmer's protection, with the result that in several cases the old specific duties were restored, and the protection to our farmers fully continued. Of course this does not please the Grit free trader who insists upon the necessities of life, except such articles as tea, coffee and sugar being on the free list, and as the food products of our farms are all 'necessaries of life,' the Grit free trader would afford them no protection at all, but would expose them to all the competition of their dear neighbors under the stars and stripes! Our farmers, however, are not to be fooled so easily as our contemporary thinks they highly value the protection which the present policy gives them, and are wisely ready to resent any attempt to take it from them. Their attitude in the respect may be seen in the late tariff revision. In the agricultural schedule it will be noted that the specific duties have been retained to a marked degree. Thus we have—live hogs, 1 1/2 cents a pound; meat in large 2 cents; fresh meats, 3 cents; lard 2 cents; eggs 5 cents a dozen; butter, 4 cents a pound; cheese, 4 cents; condensed milk, 3 cents; apples, 40 cents a barrel; buckwheat, oats, peas and rye, 10 cents a bushel; beans, wheat and potatoes, 15 cents; gooseberries, raspberries, strawberries and other small fruits, 2 cents a pound; and so on. Thus it will be seen that the Canadian farmers' home market is well protected from being made a dumping ground for the excessive production of our neighbors; and that the protection afforded them by the agricultural schedule varies from 25 per cent, to 50 per cent, or more, or fully as high in protection as is afforded to another interest by any other schedule."

CANADIAN ENGLISH MAY TRUDE.

When Hon. Mr. Foster, Finance Minister, opened up, during his visit to England, the beginning of a market for Canadian hay there, he was sneered at as a fool by the Liberal newspapers, whose business was not to encourage the getting of a market anywhere, but to lose no opportunity of abusing the present Government.

When he announced in Parliament that a profitable trade might be done in that product of the farm between Canada and Britain, the men sitting opposite to him—according to their newspapers—grew angry at his stupidity. Well, notwithstanding these sneers and merry-making, the trade was opened up, and, as those who kept posted upon such matters know, the trade is a promising one, and fully justifies Mr. Foster's statements at the time we refer to. This is now being learned even by the Grit press, and in its issue of August 17th the Cayuga Advocate has this to say:—

"Canadian hay, we are told, is now a permanent article in the English market. The trade was opened up at a time when there was an extraordinary demand for foreign hay owing to the failure of crops at home, and that it should be continued even when the English yield is normal is highly satisfactory to Canada."

The advocate adds that with proper care in producing and shipping, Canadians may yet do a profitable trade with England in hay. This is just exactly what the Minister of Finance said some years ago; but the Grit press sneered at him, as we have said.

A SOUTHERN LYNCHING.

Full details in United States papers of the lynching of six negroes near Millington, Tennessee, within the space of miles of the large city of Memphis, show the affair to have been an outrage which calls the manful tales of lynch law brutality in the Southern States into question, has shocked the civilized world elsewhere.

A number of incendiary fires had occurred in the vicinity of Millington, which negro squatters were suspected of originating, as there was a dispute between the squatters and white people regarding the proprietorship of land.

The white settlers employed a private detective of Memphis to discover the incendiaries. This man, W. T. Richardson, arrested six negroes around Millington on blank warrants, handcuffed them together and was conveying them to Memphis when the party was waylaid by fifty white men, who shot six unarmed, handcuffed and helpless negroes to death.

There was no proof whatever that the negroes were guilty of crime. The detective, Richardson, had previously arrested two of the colored men, and his charges against them could not be sustained in court. He was working for private pay and was likely to arrest somebody, right or wrong, merely to earn the money. Without proof of guilt, without trial, the six defenceless negroes were murdered in cold blood, not for the crime of rape, which white southerners usually allege as an all sufficient excuse for lynching, but on the mere suspicion of incendiarism, a comparatively minor crime.

WISE HORSE AND WISE MEN.

By taking advantage of the good sense displayed by a horse, the Chicago police recovered \$2,000 worth of stolen property, caught the thieves and added to the history of detective work one of the neatest captures that had been made in this city in a long time. The property reported stolen consisted of a wagon and horse, the wagon containing a lot of various articles. The idea was conceived of having the horse that was first recovered from the thieves put in harness and given free rein, in the hope that it might go to the barn where it belonged. This idea was put into execution. After a long journey for horse feed up a barn in the rear of Washburn Avenue, about Twenty Street, the officers concealed themselves and captured the thieves, who had several horse, buggies, and much other miscellaneous goods hidden—Chicago Horseman.

Washington advices state that reports from consular officials show that the exports of every country to the United States during the quarter July 30th last, decreased to an extraordinary degree, compared with the corresponding period of last year. Exports from the United Kingdom alone fell off more than \$16,000,000, and this during only three months. The figures from Canada are:—

Charlottetown, P. E. I., a decrease of \$101,305. Halifax, N. S., decrease of 5,719. Moncton, N. B., decrease of 36,927. Pictou, increase of 13,675. St. John's, N. B., decrease of 150,987. St. John's, N.B., decrease of 30,963. St. Stephen, N. B., decrease of 8,208. Windsor, N. S., increase of 19,930. Woodstock, N. B., increase of 9,314. Yarmouth, N. S., decrease of 119,134.

The total export for the quarter was \$1,358,539, a total decrease of \$418,423. The total exports to the United States from Ontario were \$4,018,150. The total for the same quarter in 1893 was \$4,704,949, a total decrease of \$686,799. Quebec increase and decrease is not shown. The total articles exported are valued at \$1,108,545.

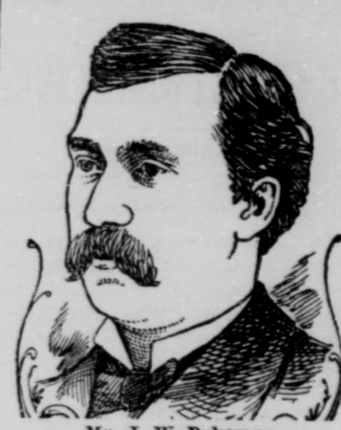

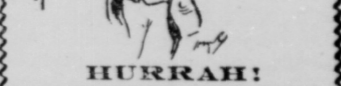
