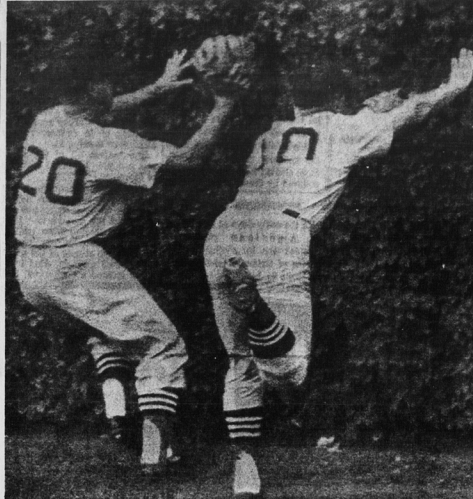


Giants Crush Dodgers 8-3; Cards, Cubs Post Victories

NEW YORK (AP)—Cassius Clay returned in triumph Wednesday from London, predicting the doom of heavyweight champion Sonny Liston in eight when he meets the greatest and denying that he carried Henry Cooper so he would fall in exactly five rounds.
