

American Counsel for Ireland.

GENERAL BUTLER, JUDGE BLACK AND ROGER A. PRYOR SELECTED TO DEFEND THE LAND LEAGUERS.

The movement to send American counsel over to Ireland to assist in defending the Land League leaders originated in Boston. Last Saturday the matter was laid before General Butler for his approval, and he expressed himself strongly in favor of the scheme, but thought that he could not get away from his business at the time the trials would come off owing to an important case he had before the United States Supreme Court.

The plan agreed on by the Land League people here was to send General Butler, General Roger A. Pryor, Jere Black, and Emory A. Steers to Ireland as counsel for the indicted Land Leaguers. There was talk of Mat Carpenter, of Wisconsin, as a substitute, in case Judge Black or any of the others should be prevented from accepting a retainer in the case. It was expected that enough money could be promptly raised in this country to defray all the expenses of the expedition. The reason why the project was started was that a rumor had gained circulation to the effect that all the leading counsel in Ireland had been retained by the Government before the indictments were found, and that Mr. Parnell and his followers were compelled to secure the services of second rate lawyers. The only question was whether American lawyers would be permitted to practice in a British court. This only could be done by courtesy, and as the courtesy has always been extended it was thought that the government would not risk the severe criticism which would necessarily follow a refusal. Leading lawyers here differ on this point, a majority maintaining that American counsel could not practise in the courts under the circumstances.

General Foreign News.

Mr. Goschen will leave Constantinople for London on the 8th of December and return in January.

A Styrian soda manufacturer writes to the Vienna New Free Press that he is ready to enter into a competition with Dr. Tanner, with beer against water. He asserts that he can fast on beer forty four days.

A despatch from Vienna to the Times says that during the debate on the budget in the Hungarian Diet the question of regulation of Hungarian rivers was discussed. The formidable competition of America in supplying grain and flour had directed attention to the regulation and improvement of water carriage as the most efficient aid in meeting the competition.

A despatch from Berlin to the Daily News says:—"A great attempt is being made to excite the indignation of students against the Jews by the Stocker party. This is already beginning to have an effect at Leipzig, where stormy meetings are held. The police have torn down placards in the southeastern quarters of the city of Berlin directly inciting the inhabitants to persecution of the Jews."
