Laying Of New Mains Boosts City Fire Fighting Capacity

The greatest amount of construction undertaken in a single year since the founding of the sewer system 65 years ago is slowly coming to a close in this city. Sidney Green, chairman of the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply, said yesterday.

Mr. Green said this work represented a tremendous improvement in the city's fire fighting capacity as the Commissioners moved to further implement the Pliometer report recommendations of two years ago.

More than 3.6 miles of new pipes have been laid just since last spring, the chairman stated, as the department moved to reinforce present mains and provide services for new subdivisions such as those in the area of the new Holy Redeemer Church and Newland Crescent East.

ities in Charlottetown—shocked citizens with the statement "the system is quite incapable of providing necessary fire flows, except in isolated instances where fire hazards are minimal".

It suggested a complete program of modernization, which, it stated, was needed in order to meet requirements of insurance underwriters and prevent a hike in insurance rates in this city.

Almost immediately, the Commissioners moved to implement the report and started with the laying of a new, large, 18-inch main into the city, along Elm Avenue.

Mr. Green said despite the vast improvement to date, through installing new mains and strengthening existing lines, the full benefit of the work would not be received until completion of the new 18-inch main planned to extend from Belvedere Avenue to connect with the new reservoir to be built next spring.

He said 11,287 feet of 8" pipe, 1,782 feet of 10 inch pipe, 2,212 feet of 12 inch pipe, and 3,559 feet of 6 inch pipe had been laid.

In addition, 28 new hydrants were installed with 270 feet of 6 inch pipe required for hydrant leads and 40 feet of four-inch pipe
