WAR NEWS.

GREEK STEAMER SUNK BY TURKISH TORPEDO BOATS

Another Greek Steamer Seized.

A GENERAL PANIC AT ATHENS.

Fortune Favors the Turks.

OPINIONS IN GREAT BRITAIN.

ATHENS, April 20.—The Greeks have occupied several positions around Damase. It is feared that a massacre has taken place at Porvosa.

During the bombardment of Salonica a Turkish torpedo boat sunk the Greek steamer Athens in Salonica gulf. On board the steamer were a number of insurgents and members of various secret societies.

A general panic prevails here. All the vessels are prohibited from leaving the gulf.

The Turks have seized the Greek steamer Kethaline.

LONDON, April 20.—A despatch to the Chronicle from Athens, dated midnight, says that General Snivenitz, in command of the Greeks at Riverie, has pushed Edhern Pasha towards Danaci. The suspense here is extreme.

LONDON, April 20.—The theory here is that the British Government are using their utmost energy to make a cessation of the conflict.

LONDON, April 20.—The Times dwells upon the provocation Turkey has received by Greece invading Crete and remaining there and then invading Macedonia. The paper asks what other power in Europe commanding a fine army, would have carried its patience so far as Turkey has done.

NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

The Ottawa Conservatives Reunited.

Costigan Stands by His Party.

OTTAWA, April 20.—The Conservatives who gave this constituency to the grits by their local disputes are reunited. The two clubs were made one at an enthusiastic meeting held last night.

The statement that the Hon. John Costigan is likely to support the Laurier Government seems to have no foundation at all. Hon. Mr. Costigan stated his position in the House of Commons the other day, and stands by his statement. He then affirmed that his position had undergone no change, except that he did not expect to take so active a share in politics as he had done.

Decision Reversed.

OTTAWA, April 20.—The Minister of Marine and Fisheries (Hon. Mr. Davies) has prepared a judgment completely reversing the decision of Captain Smith in the steamer Warwick wreck case. The Minister suspends the captain's certificate for six months and the second officer's for three months.

MEETING, AT BLOOMFIELD.

Grits Show the White Feather—Hackett and Perry Nominated.

(By Telephone from Alberton.)

Last night there was a meeting held at Bloomfield by M. Hackett's friends. Notwithstanding the bad state of the roads, the hall was well filled. Mr. Hackett, who was received with great enthusiasm, spoke first, for about an hour, with excellent effect. He scored the Laurier Government for their broken promises and mal-administration, and was followed by Hon. Mr. Ferguson in the same strain, showing the enormous expenditure for the current and next fiscal year, as shown by the Royal Gazette statements and the estimates for 1897 to 1898 recently submitted to parliament.

Mr. McLellan, assistant clerk of the House of Assembly, accepted the invitation to speak in Mr. Perry's interests. His remarks drew further replies from Messrs. Ferguson and Hackett, which made it apparent that the Grit cause is hopelessly bad.

The meeting was enthusiastically Conservative.

The special train this morning had few passengers, till it reached Summerside. But at that place and at all stations westward it was boarded by large numbers of electors, and when it arrived at Alberton it was crowded to its utmost capacity.

Nominations are in, and the candidates are Edward Hackett and S. F. Perry.

The Conservative committee at Alberton on Saturday morning communicated with the Liberal party here, suggesting that a joint meeting be held at the close of nomination, opening at 8 o'clock in the evening of the same day.

An answer was received declining the proposal. The Grits have secured Woodman's Hall for their meeting. The Conservatives will hold their meeting at the Court House, immediately after 2 o'clock.

There is much comment on the lack of courage shown by Premier Peters and his friends in declining to meet Senator Ferguson and Mr. Hackett face to face.

THE FERRIES SERVICE.

SIR,—Some time ago the Patriot newspaper made a brag that the Government had the ferry boats all ready to run on the ferries as soon as navigation opened. Well, navigation has been open now over a week and they have only made one trip here, and we are now depending on an old lobster boat neither fit to row or sail, in charge of one small boy. The Dominion candidate got a good snub here last election, and the local candidate will get a greater one at the next election if they think to spite the people for it in this manner. The Government has three boats and three or four crews, so they can have no excuse.
