Feb. Or March Likely For Legislature Sitting

The 1965 session of the Legislature will likely begin in early March or late February, and should last about six weeks, Premier W. Shaw said yesterday.

Planning for the session is expected to begin in earnest at next week's cabinet meeting.

The matter of appointing a new speaker of the House will also be considered. The speaker's post became vacant this fall with the death of John MacLean, Squire.

Also vacant is a seat in Prince County, but the premier suggested it is unlikely by-elections will be held to fill the two seats before the next session.

Briefs will be heard by the cabinet on Tuesday and reported to the government had no objection to briefs being made public by organizations that present them.

The government began last year its practice of not hearing briefs during the session.

Annual briefs come from the provincial federations of agriculture and fisheries, the home and school association and tourist association.

The premier suggested that members could arrange their speeches to conform to a certain time limit during debate.

His suggestion called for up to an hour and a half in the Throne Speech debate and budget debate by the government leader and opposition leader, with cabinet ministers taking up to an hour and other members up to 45 minutes.

Town Development Group Urges Immediate Action

GEORGETOWN — A meeting of the Georgetown Resource Development Group held Wednesday in St. James' Hall was attended by Reid Sangster, director of resources and development, and J.J. MacDonald, field manager. A roundtable discussion developed on the various aspects of development in this area, particularly as they concerned lack of plans for housing sewage and providing essential services made necessary by the current industrial development taking place here.

It was felt that the question of vital services necessary to accommodate a growing population, especially drug stores and dental services, electrical, plumbing and heating services, and other necessary facilities will, in the natural course of events, be provided.

But it was agreed that the most important question now is housing and sewage. The need of some group, locally formed or from within the town, which is financially able to promote the building of low-rental housing or apartment-style buildings and is willing to proceed at once, is an absolute necessity if workers in industry are to remain here.

BUS SERVICE RUMORED

Failure to provide such living accommodations will almost certainly result in workers leaving in other communities, and commuting here to work. It was felt that it is now more than rumor that possible transportation by bus for commuters is presently being considered.

It was agreed this possibility should point up the necessity of local housing and sewage disposal to those who up to now have taken a negative attitude to this all-important question.

It was pointed out, as an afterthought, that the town's authorities of early installation of a water and sewage system is a must with Central Mortgage and Housing if it is to loan monies to private builders, not only to provide homes but by builders of housing projects.

This guarantee, it is understood, was not forthcoming in regard to the present housing project on the west side of George Street. To assure its commencement, it is understood that measures, which cannot be expected in any future housing project, had to be utilized to enable the project to be approved.

ACTION NEEDED

The group was of the opinion that the many problems facing the area are well known by all and that if concerted action is not taken soon, the phrase "it is later than you think" may well prove to be true.

Greater interest in municipal government by the citizens in general is felt to be one way of assuring implementation of these matters.

P.E.I. TEACHERS' FEDERATION GATHERS FOR ANNUAL

Prov. Agricultural Officials Eye U.S. Duties On Potatoes

Agricultural officials here are keeping a close eye on the amounts of potatoes exported by Canada to the United States as heavy shipments could lead to increased duties.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacFarlane said yesterday there is a possibility that Canada's share to the United States may be exceeded this year, "for the first time in many years."

He said the quota is 115,000,000 pounds and already this year 35,000,000 pounds have gone to the United States. He said there is a duty of 37½ cents on each 100 pounds up to the quota. When the total exceeds that additional 100 pounds are charged at 45 cents.

"If it appears that the quota is being reached, Mr. MacFarlane said, representation will be made to Washington to have potato shipments far exceed those of the same period last year."

Already in the current crop year, potato shipments far exceed those of the same period last year.

He noted the attendance and interest in the annual meetings were also largely attended. In a quick resume of farming conditions he stated that the shortage of farm help must get more grain. "Good seed and fertilizer can yield 10 bushels more to the acre," he said, and this could cut the greater part of the farm import to this province.

BETTER DEAL

"We are expecting a better deal from ARDA for worthwhile rural development in the near future," he stated. He also said that this province must get into larger units of operation and that it was necessary that the shortage of farm help must be overcome.

"We also hope the small farm units can and will take advantage of the cole crops. He said the organized marketing program could be taken care of by the producers, assisted by the federation of agriculture.

Speaking briefly on education of farm boys and girls who are interested in farming he felt that more should be done to help the "excellent Nova Scotia Agricultural College" and that his department at the present time was making a study of the matter.

Other speakers were Smith MacFarlane, provincial president of the federation, who stressed that the federation would support any organization marketing better when organized and the members would make up their minds and said that action must be taken by the producers or someone else would be "taking the bull by the horn and swinging the cow's tail."

Dave MacLean, from the Farm Credit Co-operative, outlined briefly the changes in his department as they pertained to the Island farmer.

Flem Cotton also spoke briefly. He was congratulated previously by both Mr. MacFarlane and Mr. MacFarlane on this new appointment as beef field man and for doing an excellent job. He stressed the point of his duties and also necessary of type, grade and when to ship and offered his assistance to anyone who wished it.

Also present and taking part in the discussion were L. W. Roper, director of livestock, and Dave Smith, Kings County agricultural representative.
