## Prayer Service Is Held In The United Church

The third service in the Week of Prayer in Montague was held in the United Church, with a very large attendance. Rev. J. M. Fraser conducted the service and led in prayer.

## No Wide Gauge For Nfld. Line

OTTAWA (CP) — The government is not considering changing the narrow gauge of the CNR's Newfoundland railway to a standard gauge. Transport Minister Hees said Wednesday in the Commons.

Replying to J. W. Pickersgill (L — Bonavista-Twillingate), Mr. Hees said that CNR president Donald Gordon has said there was no reason to believe a narrow gauge railway was less efficient than a standard gauge line. To change the gauge in Newfoundland would require considerable works on curvatures of the line.

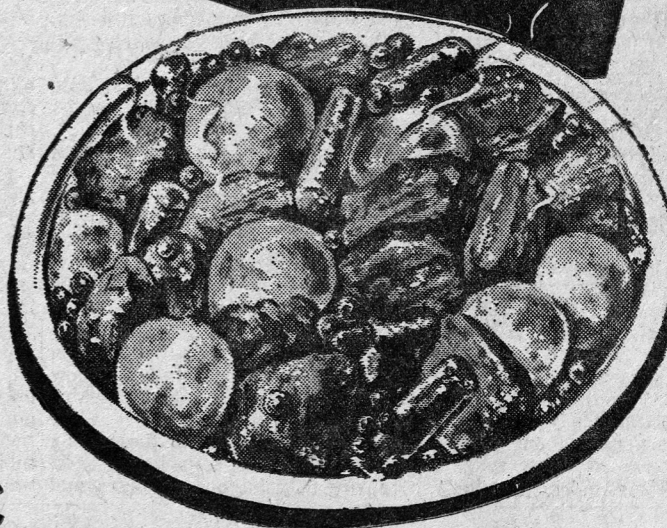
