THE SIEGE OF PARIS.

The Times correspondent at Versailles says that a painful presentiment is growing, that the stay at that dull place will be prolonged, and everything tends to confirm the conviction that the end of the war will not be reached even when Paris has fallen and the head-quarters removed to the Tuileries.

THE FOOD SUPPLY OF PARIS.

Under the above heading the Franciscan publishes the following information:—"The letters and journals of Paris, brought by the last balloon, furnish us with numerous details respecting the provisions of the capital.

THE ARSENAL OF PARIS.

The Paris correspondent of the Engineer supplies some information respecting what we may call the "arsenal work" of the city. The Government has about 3,000 tons of gunpowder in store, and the manufacture is actively going on.

WHAT RUSSIA WANTS.

It may be well to recall the articles in these treatises whose revision or modification is most likely to be insisted upon by Russia. Article 11 of the treaty concluded at Paris on the 27th April, 1856, declares that the Black Sea is neutralized, its waters and its ports thrown open to the maritime service of every nation, and formally and in perpetuity interdicted to the vessels of war, either of the power possessing its coast, or any other power.

The Times correspondent at Tours, says:—"The event of the day here is Russia's declaration that she no longer regards herself as bound by the treaties of 1856. It was published here this afternoon, and the general public has hardly yet had time to realize what its possible consequences may be, but among the limited number of persons who knew it some hours sooner the excitement was great.

We are further told that there can be little doubt but that Prussia and Russia understand each other perfectly on this matter, and that the price of Russian quinine, which Prussia devastates France, is to be permitted for the former or to purchase her designs against Turkey un molested by the latter.

"On a German sea, near the mouths of two German rivers, lies a German island (Heligoland) which was torn from us by force in the days of our weakness, and its possession is that same England which now wishes to prevent us from recovering what was ours on the Rhine.
