Take First Step In Nursing School Accreditation Plan

The Canadian Nurses' Association has announced that a Pilot Project for the Evaluation of Schools of Nursing in Canada has begun.

Twenty five schools in all 10 provinces will be surveyed over the next year to determine the quality of their educational programs and possibly set new goals for improvement in schools across the country.

"This is fundamentally an educational program which aims to help the schools help themselves," says Miss Helen Mussallem who has been appointed Director of the project undertaken by the C. N. A.

Adjourn Butter Cases To Friday

Following evidence of one witness, the preliminary hearing in Queens County magistrate's court of Frank Louis O'Brien, charged with stealing a number of pounds of butter, lard and shortening from the Riverside Hospital, yesterday morning was further adjourned until Friday, March 28, at 4.00 p.m. by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet.

O'Brien is one of nine men accused of theft or possession of goods stolen from the institution. Approximately 1200 pounds of goods were reported stolen from the institution between September 1957 and February of this year.

Health League Likes Potato

The eating and cooking habits of Canadians are taken to task in an article, "Place of Potatoes in the Diet", by Dr. L.B. Pett, Chief of the Nutrition Division of the Department of National Health and Welfare, appearing in the current issue of "Health" Magazine, official publication of the Health League of Canada.

Dr. Pett defends the much-abused potato, which has been condemned as "fattening". He says that many people avoid eating valuable foods like bread and potatoes, and yet continue to eat rich foods like chocolate pie. He points out that one chocolate usually has more calories than a fair-sized potato—and they are empty calories—just sugar and fat calories, not providing other nutritional values.

NOT "FATTENING"

"No food is fattening in itself, only in the way it is used. All foods provide calories, but a gain in weight results only when the total diet supplies more calories than the body is using up in activity. In other words, it is not the kind of food that adds weight, but the amount of food eaten, in relation to activity."

He points out that the danger of many foods is that they do not carry enough other nutritional values with their calories. This danger becomes acute as people grow older, because older people need more and more minerals and vitamins. Yet the same food habits and cooking habits persist.

Dr. Pett says that potatoes, tur-

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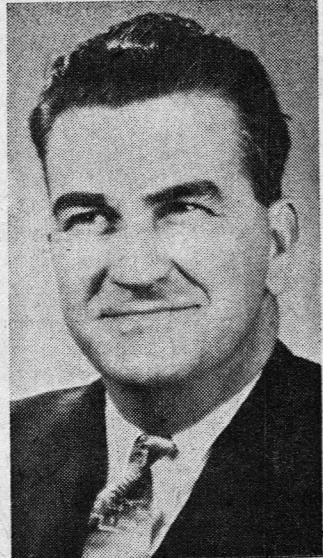
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
