University President Supports Foreign Language Papers

OTTAWA (CP)—A Canadian university president said here today that foreign language publications may provide "an unglorified chapter in the making of the Canadian nation."

Dr. Watson Kirkconnell of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., told a luncheon at the Canadian Library Association's annual meeting that the foreign language press has done valuable work in enlightening Canada to the immigrant.

Supreme Court Gives Ruling On Prayer In U.S. Schools

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Supreme Court has declared that the U.S. Constitution is violated by any requirement that a public school teacher lead her pupils in prayer.

"It is no part of the business of government to compose official prayers for any group of American people to recite as part of a religious program carried on by government," Justice Hugo L. Black said in delivering the 4-to-1 decision.

"Indifference can hurt even as terror can; loneliness in a strange land can rack the soul almost as much as slave-camp torment shared with friends in the homeland.

"It is no single process by which an alien becomes a Canadian and accepts a tradition profoundly different from his own."

He said the new Canadians should be incorporated into the office of human values on which the true Canadian destiny must be built.

Dr. Kirkconnell said there now are some 176 ethnic group papers published in 27 languages in Canada.

Representative George Andrews (Dem. Ala.) summed up one viewpoint, saying: "They put the Negroes in the schools and now they've driven God out."

Justices Felix Frankfurter and Byron R. White took no part in the school prayer ruling.
