

Local and Other Items.

EXPECTED.—The Miramichi is expected this evening.
FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer M. A. Starr left for Halifax, at nine o'clock last evening, with a cargo of lobsters, oats, potatoes, etc.
SCOTT ACT.—Five Scott cases at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. One was dismissed and four adjourned till Friday next.
DROWNED.—Last Saturday, while returning from school, Maurice LeBlanc, of Concession, Digby Co., N. S., was drowned in a mill pond where he had stopped with his brothers to fish.
THE TURF.—The managers of the New Glasgow, N. S., trotting park contemplate a grand race on Dominion day. The track is under capable management and a good time is anticipated.
HANLAN WISS.—The single scull race between Hanlan and Trickett came off on the Fitzroy river, Australia, on the 13th, and Hanlan won by six lengths.
TEMPERANCE.—Orient Division, S. of T., will hold its regular meeting this (Friday) evening in J. D. McLeod's Hall. Important matters will be discussed.—John Ross, R. S.
GOSPEL PREACHING.—Again this evening in the Christian Church's Meeting House, commencing at half-past seven. "One Lord, one Faith, one Baptism." All are cordially invited to attend.
METHODIST.—The Moncton Times says it is expected that Rev. W. W. Lodge, of Cornwall, will be stationed on the Salisbury circuit at the ensuing conference. A cordial invitation has been extended him by the proper parties.
INVESTIGATION.—The Firewardens will hold an investigation into the origin of the late disastrous fire in this city, in the City Council Chamber, on Monday evening next, commencing at 7.30. Some seven or eight witnesses will be examined.
SUPREME COURT.—A slander case has been before the Court at Summerside all this forenoon. This afternoon the cause of Dr. Jarvis vs. the town of Summerside was called on. This action arises under the late smallpox epidemic, and is brought to recover for professional services alleged to have been done.
CRICKET.—A return match between the Lawyers and Bankers vs. Allcomers, will be played at the Park, to-morrow afternoon. Stumps will be pitched at 3 o'clock sharp. We understand that the Truro Cricket Club have decided to visit the city, and play a friendly match with the Park Club on the 17th July.
BICYCLING.—There were seven starters in the 25 mile bicycle race for the champion stakes at Leicester, England, on Saturday. Fred Wood, of Leicester, won by six inches in 79m. 30s. Knapp, an American, was second. Crocker, also an American, and three others fell in a heap, but none of them was seriously injured.
SINGULAR FIND.—Mr. L. R. Miller, while making an excavation on his premises at Bridgetown, N. S., a few days ago, found a woman's hand, but no other remains, imbedded in the earth. The nails were still upon the hand, and a number of the cords and ligaments were visible. How the hand came there is a mystery.
FISH STORIES.—The Portland, Me., Argus has the champion fish story of the season. It says the largest trout taken in the Rangley Lakes this year weighed 8 1/2 pounds; and that two others were caught weighing seven pounds each. The papers which have been telling about four or five pound fish may just as well close down at once.
POISONED BY CANNED MEAT.—A young man named Henderson, residing on Cunard street, while on his way home from work last night, purchased a can of lobster for his supper. After eating a small quantity of the lobsters he was suddenly taken ill and grew black in the face. A doctor was immediately sent for, and on his arrival he found that the man had been poisoned by some acid getting into the meat which he had eaten. The doctor succeeded in restoring the man to consciousness, and he is now doing well.—Halifax Mail.

WHAT IT COSTS.—A Chicago man who evidently had considerable time to spare has studied the reports of the many missionary societies, and from them computed what it costs in dollars and cents to convert individuals to Christianity. According to his figures, to make a Methodist costs \$25, a Baptist \$30, a Congregationalist \$45, a Presbyterian \$60, while it costs as high as \$300 to get a convert into the Episcopal Church, and \$300 into the Catholic Church. In Africa it costs \$14 to convert, in Italy \$42, in Spain \$55, in the East Indies \$30. A Japanese costs \$80, a Chinese \$100, and every Christianised Jew costs \$2,800.

CLEARED UP.—The mystery surrounding the boat found bottom up in the harbor a few days ago has been solved. Mr. Archibald McLean, keeper of the Blockhouse Light, while in the city saw the boat, and at once recognized it as belonging to Lauchlin McLean's lobster factory at Governor's Island. Some people in town, who had relatives working in the factory, asked Mr. McLean to find out the facts connected with the losing of the boat, and to ascertain if any person was missing. This Mr. McLean consented to do, and on Wednesday morning, in company with his brother Hector, he went over to the Island in search of the desired information. He was there told that on Monday evening the little schooner Ark, in charge of some of the factory employees, and having the boat in tow, left the Island for Point Prim after some lobster traps. When they had got about midway between the Island and the Point the wind began blowing hard and the sea to run high. As a result the boat filled with water and sunk. The weight of the sunken boat was bearing down the little craft which had her in tow, and it was finally decided to cut her adrift. The St. Lawrence in passing shortly afterwards saw the boat and brought word to the city. For a time the worst was feared, but there is no necessity for further anxiety.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Presbyterian Conference.
SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.
HALIFAX, June 14.
There was a larger number of commissioners present at the Assembly to-day. The morning sederunt was occupied by the appointment of committees. It was agreed that home missions be taken up to-night and foreign missions to-morrow, the French evangelization committee celebration of the 200th anniversary of the revolution of 1688 on Monday evening, religion and temperance on Tuesday evening, and Sabbath schools and Sabbath observance on Wednesday evening.
The remit of the marriage question was set for Tuesday morning.
Thirteen applications were made for leave to retire from the active ministry. The only lively discussion that took place to-day was on an application presented by Dr. Murray on behalf of Dr. McLeod, Sydney, to have his name left on the Presbyterian roll as Pastor Emeritus of his old congregation.
Judge Stevens opposed this strongly, while Dr. Caven wanted this carried. The Judge won the day. No precedent could be shown for such a title.
Mrs. Ritchey, wife of the Lieut.-Governor, has invited the members of the assembly to an "at home" Wednesday evening next. They accepted with cheers.
The evening session was taken up with the consideration of the home mission and augmentation reports. The reports showed a surplus in the Eastern section of \$5000 and a deficit in the Western section of \$2500. The reports were adopted and suitable resolutions passed.

THE RIFLE.

The Inter-Provincial Match WON BY NEW BRUNSWICK.

HALIFAX, June 14.
For the second time, New Brunswick has won the Interprovincial Rifle Match, but to-day's victory is the more creditable because they vanquished Nova Scotia on its own ground, and in a wind that at times was a perfect puzzle to all the New Brunswick and P. E. Island visitors. The weather was fine, but a strong, gusty, cross rear wind prevailed. At 200 yards the scores were: Nova Scotia, 239; New Brunswick, 235; P. E. Island, 234. At 500 yards the home team fell away behind, the scores being: New Brunswick, 223; P. E. Island, 208; Nova Scotia 206, New Brunswick leading by 13 points, and being 20 points ahead of P. E. Island. The excitement was at its height when the teams came back to the 600 yards mounds. On the first pair P. E. Island beat New Brunswick 10 points and Nova Scotia 2. In the second pair the home team were again behind the New Brunswick team, gaining two on the Islanders. The next pair of New Brunswickers made exactly tie—same scores as last—while the Nova Scotians and P. E. Islanders fell back 5 and 14 respectively. Then came the last pair when the six laid down New Brunswick had a lead of 19 over Nova Scotia and 44 over P. E. Island. Dover and Blair were the Nova Scotia men and they each made 27, while the New Brunswickers only got 51, but enough to give them the match by 15 points, the P. E. Island pair being eleven behind. The total scores are: New Brunswick, 661; Nova Scotia, 646; P. E. Island, 616. The visitors were entertained by the Nova Scotia men after the match. The most social time was spent at the hotel.

THE EMPEROR'S CONDITION.

Weaker but Conscious.
LONDON, June 14.
In the Commons this p. m., Hon. Mr. Smith, First Lord of the Admiralty, said the Government received a despatch from Berlin dated 3 p. m., stating that the Emperor was very much worse and there was no hope of his recovery. Inflammation of the lungs had set in. The Emperor's intellect was perfectly clear. He was suffering no pain, Mr. Smith stated that it was with regret that he made the communication regarding the Emperor's condition to Parliament.

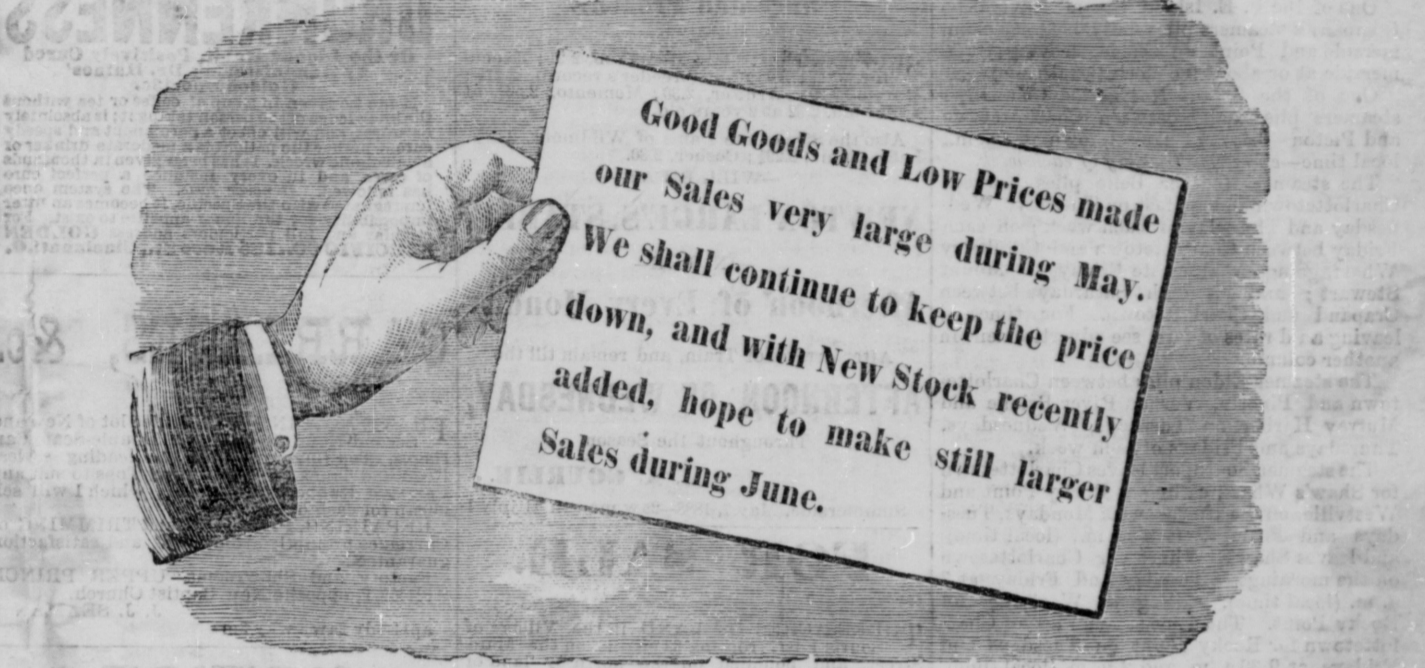

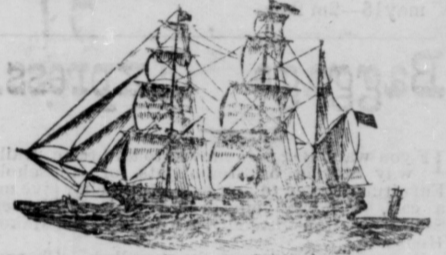
