

Chicago Black Hawk Club Dominates Dream Team

MONTREAL (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks, who this season again missed their perennial quest for first place and were knocked out in the Stanley Cup semi-finals, have won their share of National Hockey League stardom for 1965-66.

The Hawks, led by left winger Bobby Hull, won four of the six positions on the NHL's first all-star team, announced Thursday. They also took one spot on the second team.

The teams, with points in brackets:

First team: Goal — Glenn Hall, Chicago (144); Defence — Jacques Laperriere, Montreal (119); Pierre Pilote, Chicago (102); Centre — Stan Mikita, Chicago (100); Left wing — Hull, Chicago (180); Right wing — Gordie Howe, Detroit (160).

Second team: Goal — Lorne Worsley, Montreal (85); Defence — Allan Stanley, Toronto (77); Pat Stapleton, Chicago (69); Centre — Jean Beliveau, Montreal (89); Left wing — Frank Mahovlich, Toronto (59); Right wing — Bobby Rousseau, Montreal (113).

son when he scored 54 goals and finished the campaign with 57 points, was the lone unanimous choice with 90 points in each half of the schedule.

All six players named to the first team have had all-star recognition in the past while three players named to the second team are making their first all-star appearances.

The only change from the mid-season poll is at centre where Mikita replaced Norm Ullman, of Detroit, who slipped to third place in the over-all voting.

Making their initial appearances on an all-star team are Worsley, Stapleton and Rousseau. Worsley, along with back-up netminder Charlie Hodge,

won the Vezina Trophy at the end of the 1965-66 season.

The Vezina Trophy is awarded to the goalkeeper having played a minimum 25 games for the team with the fewest goals scored against it.

Howe has been named to the first team a record-breaking ninth time and to either team for a record 17th time, including 11 straight seasons.

Maurice (Rocket) Richard, former Montreal great, holds the record of 14 straight all-star appearances and, until this season, shared the record with Howe for most first-team appearances.

Hall also has been named to the second team three times and his total of nine appearances breaks the goaltenders' record

of eight set by Frank Brimsek, former Boston Bruins player.

Pilote, Laperriere and Hull are holdovers from the 1964-65 first team while Mikita, Mahovlich and Howe were on the second team a year ago.

Voting was closest in the defence positions with only six points separating the players ranked fourth through seventh. Stapleton edged J. C. Tremblay of Montreal by one point for the second berth on the second team and Harry Howell of New York Rangers finished three points behind Stapleton. Doug Barkley of Detroit was six points away from the second-team berth.

Each player on the over-all first all-star squad receives \$1,000 while second-team members each get \$500. In addition,

Casey Stengel To Be No. 1 Guest Of Honor

NEW YORK (AP) — Casey Stengel will haul his familiar No. 37 uniform out of mothballs and become a manager for an evening again here July 30.

The New York Mets said Thursday that Stengel will be the No. 1 honored guest in the team's annual old timers game preceding the regular night game with Leo Durocher's Chicago Cubs.

It is also Casey's 76th birthday.

"This will mark the first time Casey has had on his uniform since he suffered a hip injury July 24 last year," a Met spokesman said.

The old timers game will be built around the theme of the 1950 baseball all-star game, the first of 10 in which Stengel was manager. In that game, Casey handled the American Leaguers, losing a 14-inning marathon to the National League 4-3.

TO MANAGE LEAGUERS

Players who participated will be invited to attend the affair July 30. Stengel will manage the American Leaguers again.

From the list who participated in the all-star game 16 years ago, six became managers. They included Gil Hodges, Eddie Stanky, Dick Sisler, Marty Marion, Red Schoendienst and Yogi Berra.

Robin Roberts, who pitched for the National Leaguers then as star of the Phillies, is still active, pitching for the Houston Astros.

Others to be invited to the Shea Stadium party for Stengel are Willie Jones, Ralph Kiner, Roy Campanella, Stan Musial, Phil Rizzuto, George Kell and Larry Doby, who played the entire 14 innings of the longest all-star game in history.

Stengel, who managed New York Yankee championship teams before going to the Mets, retired at the end of last season and was replaced by Wes Westrum.

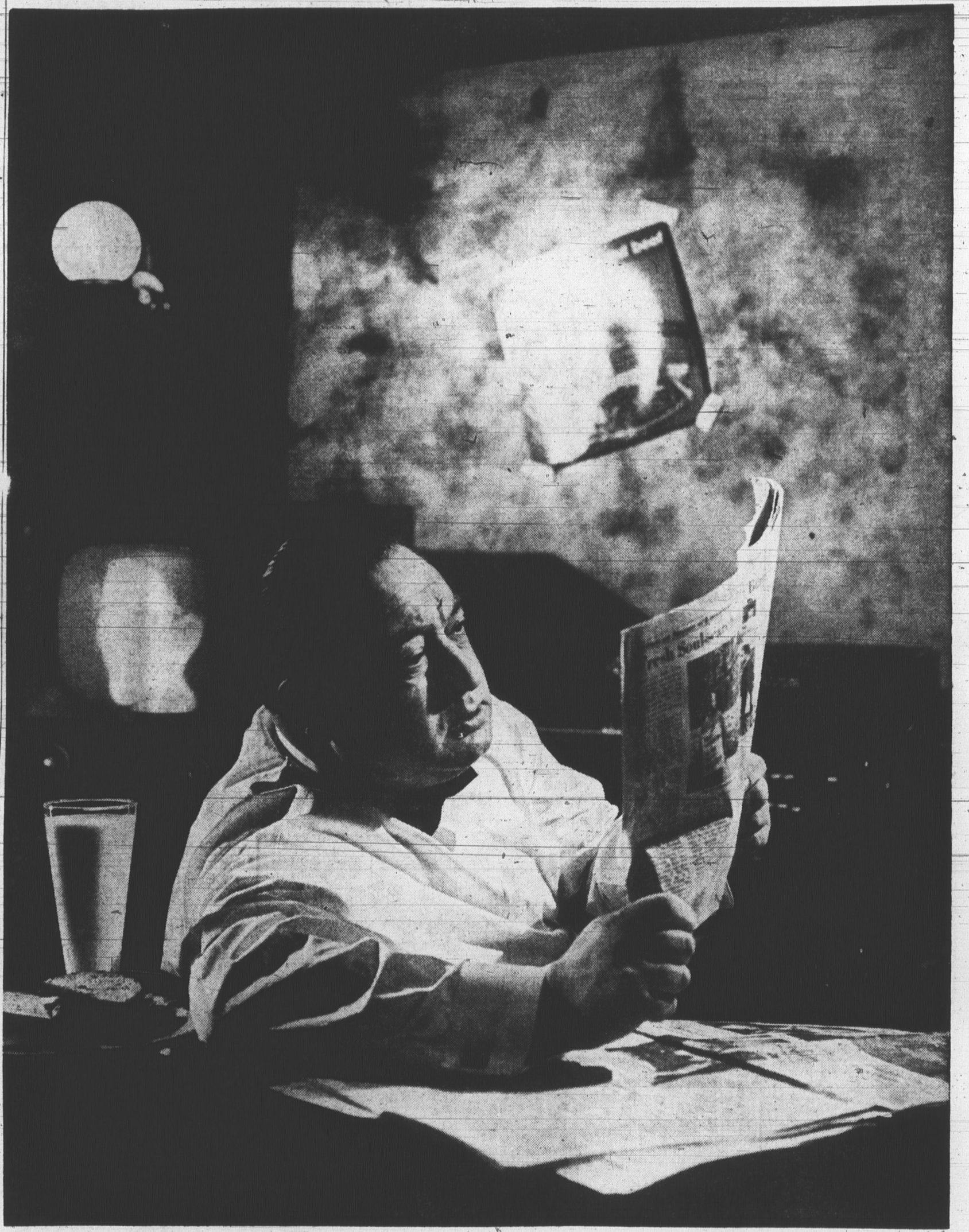
