ANOTHER GREAT SUCCESS.

Political Meeting at Milton Last Evening.

The hall at Milton was crowded. The meeting was organized by appointing Mr. Arthur Holroyd to the chair. Sir Louis then commenced his speech and claimed that the Government was pure and honest—all clean men fulfilled their promises, and claimed credit for the great prosperity that ruled in Canada. Spoke for one hour and satisfied himself even if the audience doubted.

He was followed by Mr. Stewart for one hour. Mr. Stewart refuted Davies' arguments and proved from the statistical year book that Sir Davies was inaccurate in his statement about the Post Office revenue. He probed the speech through and through, reviewed every department and said that the present government were not entitled to the confidence of the electorate. They were political charlatans and intriguers.

Mr. Donald Farquharson then followed in a rambling, discursive manner. He claimed that they had a surplus, they were worthy of confidence, and that they should be judged by this matter of surplus, although he himself was raising P. E. I. land with debentures, debt and extravagance.

Mr. Wise followed, and in a very able speech from the farmer's standpoint showed the emptiness of Mr. Farquharson's reasoning. He showed the increased prices of the commodities the farmers purchased. He spoke for twenty minutes and was well received.

Dr. Douglas then spoke for twenty minutes, endorsing his master Mr. Farquharson, and eulogizing Sir Louis Davies and claimed that the Government built the Crown's Nest Railway, and they should get credit for this. Laurier, he said, was the greatest statesman that Canada ever had, because he was French, and tried to argue that opposition to Laurier and Tarte was a reflection on the French people of Quebec.

Dr. McNeill followed, and although the hour was late the audience listened with close attention. He quoted Laurier's own words about the probability of Mutual Preferential Trade in 1896, and showed that he repudiated it afterwards. He then quoted Tarte's sayings in Paris and Quebec and said that a Minister of a Government who would speak as he did was nothing else but a disloyal and dishonest man and a traitor to his country, and neither he nor his colleagues that supported him in the Cabinet were worthy of the confidence of the electors. He showed that Dr. Douglas was inaccurate in saying that the government built the Crown's Nest Railway. But what they did was to increase the subsidy to a far greater amount than the Conservatives agreed to give.

Mr. Farquharson left in a hurry. As Mr. Wise stated, he could not wait to take his medicine, as his imperialistic conduct in grinding taxes out of the people would not stand investigation. His conduct is "rank and smells to heaven."

A vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman for his able conduct in the chair. A feeble cheer was given to Sir Louis Davies, and hearty, enthusiastic cheers for Mr. Stewart and Sir Charles Tupper. The meeting was a great victory for the Conservative party, and augurs well for the result on election day.

SIGN OF THE TIMES.

We note that "Mr. F. L. Hazard, Q. C." gave a very effective campaign speech—the Patriot's report—at the last meeting of the Young Liberals; Mr. Hazard being, if we mistake not, Stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown and Judge of the City Court. We notice also that Mr. H. James Palmer is taking an active part in the campaign.

From the party point of view, we have no objection whatever to this activity on the part of these officers of justice—these gentlemen who hold the scales and give sentence between man and man in this Province. The fact that these Magistrates, who receive stipends from the public treasury have been constrained to enter the political arena on behalf of the Tarte-Laurier government, only shows the poverty of the government party as to men capable of carrying on the contest. But it is not—we submit that it is not—calculated to raise the Magisterial Bench in the eyes of the public. Nor is it consistent with the precedent set by Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. It is, if we mistake not, but another indication of a lowered standard of justice and morality since the New Liberals have obtained control of public affairs.
