Halifax Port Tie-Up Threat Seen In Federal Labor Bill

HALIFAX (CP) — Halifax waterfront officials here reviewing both labor and employers said the federal labor standards bill now before Parliament threatens its port with its biggest tie-up of shipping ever.

Dock workers here often work as much as 70 hours per week during the busy winter shipping season in order to keep cargo moving and ships from being delayed.

The bill, if passed, they said, would mean that all port workers who come under federal jurisdiction will be prohibited

from working more than eight hours overtime a week. This would affect most waterfront workers including stevedores and freight handlers.

WANTS DISPENSATION
Ray March, executive secretary of the Port of Halifax Commission, said his group is requesting "that the port of Halifax and indeed all Atlantic ports will get some form of dispensation from this bill."

Mr. March said a clause in the bill until July 1, 1966, in special cases where he is satisfied that hardship may be caused to employees.

"This as I see it is the only hope of warding off the immediate effects of the bill... Our only hope is to get a postponement or 18 months to allow us to readjust to the situation."

Mr. March said, president of the Halifax Longshoremen's Association (C.I.U.) have sent protests to Labor Minister MacEachen.

"The longshoremen of this port, and shipping firms too, rely on those four precious winter months to keep them going financially for the whole year," Mr. Mathers said. They had received no reply to their protests yet, he added.

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
