Our Industries.

The industries of Canada have made very great strides since 1878: and will never again be what they were in the days of jug handled Free Trade.

Hands employed... 1878 1884
Wages paid... \$ 8,174,900 \$12,870,900
Annual product... 34,131,100 55,554,500

Thus, Mr. Blakeby shows that for Ontario and Quebec alone, the increase since 1878 has been as follows:—Hands employed 27,664, annual wages paid \$8,737,000, annual product \$48,000,000, and capital invested \$22,000,000!

BRITISH PARLIAMENT

A Disgraceful Scene

O'BRIEN SUSPENDED.

LONDON, Feb. 24.

In the Commons, to-day, a motion was made to suspend the regular order, so as to enable the Commons to resume the debate on the resolution censuring the Government for its Egyptian policy.

At this the Parnellites nearly all joined in a prolonged howl, and in derisive cheers. O'Brien, editor of United Ireland, shouted out: "We will remember this in Ireland." This was greeted with cries of "Oh! Oh! name him."

The Speaker thereupon named O'Brien. Gladstone at once moved that the named member be suspended.

O'Brien jumped up and shouted, "That is the honor of my ambition."

After the uproar had subsided, Thomas Seaton rose to a point of order.

He was overruled by the Speaker. A division was then called upon Gladstone's motion to suspend O'Brien. It resulted in a vote of 244 for and 20 against.

The Speaker then ordered O'Brien to withdraw.

O'Brien arose, straightened himself up, and exclaiming with great precision and sarcasm, "Certainly, sir, I will withdraw from the House with more pleasure than I entered it," strode out.

The Parnellites objected to the resumption of the debate on the motion of censure, because it would prevent discussion of a motion made by Redmond relating to the conduct of an Irish constable named Murphy.

THE CLOTURE. When the House again settled down to business, cloture was voted 207 to 46.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Tupper's Bill About Wharves

Discussed and Referred to Special Committee

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.

On the second reading of the Bill respecting wharves, docks and piers constructed in navigable waters, Tupper said, in consequence of the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, all wharves on navigable waters were obstructions and could be removed by any body.

Tupper proposed to refer the bill to a select committee for full investigation.

Blake thought the Bill so important that the Government should have taken the responsibility of its introduction.

Sir John said the Bill had been introduced by Tupper without any concert with the Government. It was before the House, and it was therefore better that it should go to a committee.

The Government could afterwards decide whether or not they should take up the matter.

Woodworth thought the matter so important that the Government should deal with it. The interests affected were very great.

Vail hoped the Government would not attempt to claim the right to grant water lots on the coast outside of harbors.

Tupper said the decision of the Supreme Court left the matter in such a condition that legislation was necessary.

After discussion, participated in by Davies, Mills and Sir John, the latter moved that the debate be adjourned to give time for further consideration. Carried.

The Irish Times states that it is gratified with the proposed visit of the Prince. It says we cannot imagine that any one should treat the Prince's intention other than a frank and generous repatriation for past neglect of Ireland.
