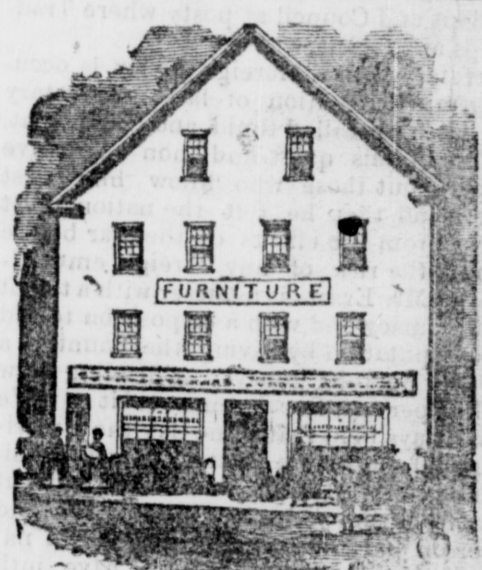

## NORMAL SCHOOL EXAMINATION.

YESTERDAY the scholars attending this institution underwent their annual examination. There were present Professor Anderson and Mrs. Anderson, Professors Caven and Manning, H. Lawson, J. H. Fletcher, Miss Robinson, Mrs. J. and Miss Lawson, and others.

#### NORMAL DEPARTMENT.

In the Principal Department, Professor Anderson first examined the classes in English Grammar and Analysis. He selected an exceedingly difficult passage from Milton, and the answers, though sometimes wrong, invariably showed that the scholars thought, or tried to think, before they spoke. Intelligence was very apparent. Professor Anderson also put a few test questions in ancient history. The promptitude and exactitude with which the answers were given, indicated not merely good powers of memory, but thorough knowledge. Professor Caven examined the Senior Latin Class, composed of Mr. Stanfield Lord and Mr. Martin. The latter, who has, we learn, only been studying the language since September—showed that he made extraordinary progress. He translated part of one of Horace's odes without the slightest difficulty. Mr. Manning examined the Geometry Class, and expressed himself highly pleased with the result. Two of the pupils read selections of poetry in good style.
