Nfld. Special Session Is Said Unnecessary

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Rex Renouf (PC - Saint John's South) said Wednesday the present emergency session of the legislature called by Premier Smallwood to protest the federal government's handling of Term 29 "is an unnecessary one in many ways."

He said the setting "is a political one with the shadow of an election... a crusade, hovering over us. This setting is an emotional one."

Premier Smallwood has hinted he will call an election if the resolution is introduced Tuesday concerning the 1962 termination of Newfoundland's special grants under Term 29 of the confederation agreement does not receive the unanimous approval of the House.

"The people have had a belly-ful of trouble, emotion and confusion," Mr. Renouf said. Speaking in debate on the resolution he suggested that the next session of the legislature would be a more appropriate time to bring up the issue.

"The House shouldn't be used to mislead the people. Thousands of our people have only the haziest notion of Term 29. I feel the people should read Term 29 and the debates on the subject in the House of Commons. Calm, reason and common sense would prevail.

"Our people are confused and anxious" and even constitutional lawyers were confused about the term.

RECALLS 1949 CAMPAIGN
He recalled that before confederation "we could indulge in a fierce loyalty" to Newfoundland only. The 1949 confederation campaign pitted Newfoundlander against Newfoundlander.

"Their minds became so clouded with all sorts of emotion that

they would not listen to any cool and rational attitude."

Since confederation "we took on a dual loyalty and responsibility." The provincial and federal governments "should go hand in hand. What is advantageous to Newfoundland is advantageous to Canada."

"A psychological fence is going to be erected around this province if this war continues. We should not isolate ourselves from the stream of thought in Canada."

The Newfoundland Grants Act, passed by the Commons last week, provides for payment of \$36,500,000 to the province over a five-year period ending March 31, 1962. The royal commission reviewed the Confederation agreement recommended annual payments as a special to 1962 and "thereafter."

The federal government contends that its duty will have been done when the final payment is made in 1962. Premier Smallwood interprets Term 29 as guaranteeing special aid of Newfoundland indefinitely.

Observers were divided on whether Mr. Smallwood would actually call an election if the house doesn't support a man his censure of the federal government. It appeared unlikely he would get unanimous backing.

Progressive Conservative House Leader Malcolm Hollick and Mr. Renouf have said they will oppose the resolution.

James Higgins and A. M. Duffy who bolted the Conservative party last week to form the Newfoundland Party, will support the premier. A vote was not expected before late today.

Mr. Smallwood's Liberal government holds 31 of the 36 House seats. Conservatives have two and the Newfoundland party two. There is one vacancy.

Beaverbrook To Be Guest Speaker At APEC Dinner

HALIFAX — Lord Beaverbrook, noted British publisher, author, politician and benefactor, has accepted an invitation to be the guest speaker at the APEC Annual dinner during the 1959 Atlantic Conference in Fredericton September 14-15. It was announced today by APEC president, Dr. Frank MacKinnon of Charlottetown.

Long an influential and controversial figure in British politics, the Canadian-born Max Aitken was Minister of Information during the latter part of World War I. During World War II he was in succession Minister of Aircraft Production, Minister of State and Minister of Supply. He held the appointment of Lord Privy Seal from September 1943 to July 1945.

Born in Maple, Ontario, in 1879 he is the son of the late Rev. Wm. Aitken of Newcastle, New Brunswick. In 1906 he married Gladys Drury, third daughter of the late General Charles William Drury, CB, of Halifax, Nova Scotia. His wife died in 1927.

The one-time Halifax and Montreal bond salesman has maintained a vigorous interest in the Atlantic Provinces, particularly in the Province of New Brunswick, where his benefactions are becoming legend. When the province of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Newfoundland established an Atlantic Provinces House in London, England, last year, Lord Beaverbrook invited prominent British industrialists, government

leaders, and financial principals to meet Agent General Watson James.

While the subject of his address to those attending the 1959 Atlantic Conference has not been announced, it is anticipated he will draw largely on the subject matter of his three most recent books, "Don't Trust to Luck", "Three Keys to Success", and "Men and Power".

Car Insurance Rates To Be Cut

MONTREAL (CP) — The Canadian Underwriters' Association Wednesday announced a move to reduce automobile insurance rates for drivers least likely to become involved in accidents.

The CUA, representing a segment of the Canadian insurance industry, said that a new insurance rating classification — class 1A select — is to be established Sept. 1 by its member companies.

The classification calls for a 20-per-cent discount off the insurance rates the motorist normally would pay. The reduction would be in addition to the discounts of up to 35 per cent off standard rates already granted drivers with three years of accident-free driving.

The additional discount will be given to drivers who:

1. Have been driving for five years without an accident;

2. Drive their cars not more than 10,000 miles a year;

3. Do not use their cars for business, or for driving to and from work;

4. Have no male driver under 25 in the household; and not more than two drivers of the vehicle.

The announcement said motorists eligible will move into the new classification as their car insurance comes up for normal renewal on or after Sept. 1.

Cod, Herring And Lobsters Contribute To June Increase

HALIFAX, N.S. — According to a joint release by the Department of Fisheries and the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the fishermen of the Maritime Provinces during the month of June landed nearly 101 million lbs. of fish for which they received over \$6 1/2 million. This represented an increase over the month of May of nearly 40 million lbs. and \$1.3 million, and brought the total landings for the first six months of this year to 281 million lbs. valued at \$19 million.

June is commonly the month of peak performance by Maritime fishermen, since the combination of the weather, fish abundance and fishing regulations permits them to exert a relatively greater effort upon the

capture of the main commercial species. The June catch this year exceeded that of 1958 by 6.6 million lbs., for an increase in landed value of about \$900,000. The principal species contributing to this increase were cod, herring, and lobsters.

The volume of fish caught during the first six months of this year was somewhat below the volume caught during the same period last year, 261.2 million lbs., as against 264.6 million lbs. Despite this decrease, the earnings of fishermen rose by \$2.1 million, \$19.0 million this year as against \$16.9 million in 1958. Higher prices for lobsters and groundfish, particularly haddock, were largely responsible for this improvement in fishermen's returns.
