OTTAWA, Oct. 22. T. H. Campbell, Immigration Agent in the North-west, says that at least two thousand people have come from Dakota to Canada this season, and are comfortably settled. He is confident that this is only the beginning of a big influx from Dakota to take place next season, as those who have come are now enthusiastic immigration agents.

LONDON, Oct. 22. It has been settled that Hon. W. L. Jackson, now Financial Secretary of the Treasury, will be promoted to the position of Chief Secretary for Ireland, succeeding Balfour, who has been made leader of the House of Commons.

Elections in Chili.

SANTIAGO, De Chili, Oct. 22. Elections in Chili for President and the Senate show an overwhelming defeat for the clerical party. The Liberals have a large majority in the electoral college, which appoints the President.

No Prospect for Conciliation.

DUBLIN, Oct. 22. The Freeman's Journal to-day says the speeches made by members of the National League yesterday render hopeless all ideas of peace and conciliation.

News Notes.

A number of U. S. Marines have been killed in a fight with Chilians in Valparaiso, and there is a flutter at Washington in consequence.

The Chinese Government has directed its ambassador at St. Petersburg to demand explanations from Russia for her encroachments upon the Pamir territory.

At Mancelona, Mich., the other day Charles Werner stumbled into an old well and fell to the bottom, a distance of 80 feet. He leaves a wife and an infant child.

A Rome despatch says the earthquake shocks at the island of Pantellina and vicinity continue. A volcano has arisen in the bed of the sea off the coast of Pantellina, which ejects masses of stone to a great height.

It is semi-officially announced from Rome that the Italian Government has decided to raise the prohibition placed upon the importation into Italy of American salted meats, and that an official decree to this effect will shortly be published.

Between 340 and 350 men are employed in perfecting the landscape features of the World's Exposition site in Chicago. It is the intention to make the grounds exceedingly beautiful by walks, drives, lawns, terraces, fountains, shrubbery, and flowers. Several hundred thousand dollars are to be expended for this purpose.

The World's Fair Committee of the American Jersey Cattle Club has addressed a circular letter to every breeder of Jersey cattle in America for the purpose of enlisting his aid in securing for the Jersey breed a creditable representation in the live stock department of the Exposition and in the dairy tests which are to be made. This committee is composed of J. J. Richardson of Iowa, W. J. Webster of Tennessee, John Boyd of Illinois, and F. E. Shaw and P. J. Cogswell of New York, all of whom are well-known cattle breeders. In their circular letter they say that it has been decided to show at the Fair a herd of fifty Jersey cows in milk, and that the association will bear all expense of transporting, caring for, and feeding them. The breeders are asked to furnish one or more of their finest cows to this herd. The letter gives also the terms of the proposed milk and butter tests. The prospects are most encouraging that all of the chief breeders of dairy cattle will be represented by herds of fifty exceptionally fine animals, and that the tests will be so successfully conducted that the results will be quoted as standard authority for years to come on the question of the relative merits of the respective breeds.
