International agency to supervise collection and distribution of atomic materials for the international pool Eisenhower proposed. The seven sponsors of the resolution suggest that the agency be set up similar to the UN's specialized agencies, which are related to the UN but govern their own affairs. Russia is known to support the idea that the agency be within the UN. The seven powers oppose this view as it could subject the agency to the paralyzing effect of the security council veto.

\$30,000 Fire In Wolfville

WOLFVILLE, N. S. (CP)—Kentville fire chief Bev Wade and his crew rushed Tuesday night to help Wolfville firemen fight a \$30,000 fire that destroyed his own grocery, a children's wear store and an apartment. The fire threatened the entire business section of this Annapolis valley university town. A store employee suffered face and head burns and a fireman was overcome by smoke. The building was owned by Morley Welsh, whose wife ran the children's wear store. Lieut. and Mrs. Lemuel Morine occupied the apartment and had their belongings packed for moving. They lost everything. Cause of the fire was not known.

Jet Fighter Pilot Killed in Crash

CHATHAM, N. B. (CP)—The air force Tuesday night released the name of a jet fighter pilot killed earlier in the day when his plane crashed in an open field about two miles from its base here on a routine training flight. Killed was PO. Robert Allan Ralph Hart, 25, of Midland, Ont. He was unmarried and a student with No. 1 fighter operational training unit here. His death occurred three days before he was to graduate from the training unit. He was the third to die in the original group of 24. RCAF officials said Hart was in the single-seat aircraft when it struck in a field owned by Everett Travers. He was dying when a medical officer, Ptl. Lt. Francisc Hebert, reached the scene via helicopter shortly after the crash. A board of inquiry is conducting an investigation.

MARKETING BOARD CHAIRMAN REVIEWS PLEBISCITE ISSUES

Following are excerpts from a statements of the Potato Board radio address given last evening. All Mr. Scates or anyone else has to do is to read the profit and loss statements and the accompanying reports as compiled by H. R. Doan & Company to ascertain the true and correct facts regarding all past Board finances.

"Both Mr. Reid and Mr. Scates talk about co-operation and harmony between producers and dealers. The door has always been and still is wide open for such. However, we feel that commendable as this may be there is sometimes too high a price to pay for co-operation or even co-existence. The Potato Board can only go so far in this direction as we feel producers expect their own organization to be something better than a mere, pagod thing of sombre sway with front of brass and feet of clay.

"Those opposing the operation of a producer controlled Central Selling Agency have told you that a farmer will not be able to sell his potatoes where he wants to sell them for whatever price he wants to get for them. On the surface all this sounds fine, but those same gentlemen forgot to remind you that farmers only want to sell their potatoes where they can get the most money for them. You have been told that little P. E. I. is not big enough to control potato markets. We never claimed that a marketing pool could do this. All we ever claimed is that which is all we can ever do, namely, to secure at all times and under all conditions the full market price for all our potato growers. We have competitive selling factors enough outside this province without unlearning the most damaging practice of a nameless, competition among ourselves with business going to the individual offering the lowest price.

"Under a Selling Agency no speculation on Island potatoes at your expense will be possible. Initial payments at the highest possible level will be paid upon delivery. The balance—or at least most of it—will be immediately after the end of each period. Under this plan you may not receive as much money at the beginning, but you will receive more in the long run and that is what really counts. There will be no flooding of markets—no hit or miss methods as you have known in the past. The small producer with a carload of potatoes to sell will—grade for grade—variety for variety—get the same price as a large grower with 50 or 100 carloads to market. Those who oppose the set-up of a Selling Agency say this is all very well but if this Selling Agency is a good thing why not make it voluntary. It is surprising how reasonable those arguments appear to be when they are proposing something which means nothing.

"They now say they do not want what they call a compulsory Selling Agency but they want a
