Thoughts For Our Time

Though regrettable it seems nevertheless true, that man only learns how to be a man when faced with suffering and disaster. True our consolation comes from others, our joy from their joy, and our success from their success, but it is only in their joy and success that we are truly human, but it is only in their suffering and disaster that we are truly human. Only their sufferings, only their disasters seem capable of eliciting our heartfelt sympathy which no fault can create, a sympathy which would seem therefore to be the most amazing of human experiences.

But do we ever learn our lesson? How very short-lived human memory appears to be! Once the disaster or danger of disaster has passed, do we not quickly return to our old ways? For believers in Divine Providence can it be any great wonder when that All Good and All Wise God permits disaster after disaster to afflict a seemingly ever faithful man-kind? The more foolish of men are inclined to accept those God-given lessons with ill grace indeed, and to clutch there will always be such as these. But the real tragedy lies in the fact that even the more wise do not seem to long benefit from these lessons.

Consider a nation or several nations at war with a common enemy that threatens their very existence as a nation. How much more acutely aware are the peoples of that nation or nations of their common brotherhood! How much more sincerely is that brotherhood practiced! Differences of religion, of class, of social standing, of economic status do not prevent co-operation of all in the common task. Indeed those very differences con-

But did we stop to think that all he was doing was putting into practice a fundamental principle that governs our whole economic system?

In "normal" times we try to separate economics and morals. We live by the generally accepted heresy that the common good will best be promoted by the interplay of conflicting selfish interests. We act like the beasts in the jungle. It is in times of peril and disaster that we act like human beings. Will we ever learn from our disasters how to make our "normal" times human?

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALBERT W. MacNEILL

On Monday, May 1st, there passed peacefully away at her home, Parkview Farm, Cavendish, Mrs. Albert W. MacNeill at the age of eighty-three years. Although not in her usual good health all winter she never was heard to complain, but friends who called on her could see her failing fast. Just ten days before her death she became bedfast. From then on she gradually grew weaker. She did not suffer any pain or discomfort and her mind remained clear almost to the end, as she slipped quietly and peacefully away shortly after noon on the above mentioned date.

Mrs. MacNeill was the former Bessie MacNeill, daughter of the late Anne Semple and Robert W. Stevenson of New Glasgow, P. E. I. She came to Cavendish as a young bride and there endeared herself to all. Of a quiet and unassuming nature she was always willing to give of her time and talents. She was a faithful member of the Cavendish United Church and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society; although unable to attend regularly of late years, she was always interested and ready to help.

In Nov. 1926 she mourned the loss of her only daughter Lettie (Mrs. Milton MacKenzie) who died in the prime of young womanhood. In Dec. 1928 she was called on to mourn the death of her husband.

There are left to mourn her loss one son, Lorne; his wife Mary, who tenderly nursed her during her illness and two grandsons, Eric and Alvin, all in the home. She also leaves two sisters, (Margaret) Mrs. Alex Toombs, and Jennie (Mrs. Robert MacKenzie) both of Cavendish, and one brother Robert I. Stevenson, Brockton, Mass., U. S. A.; also a great many nieces and nephews in the United States and here.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon, May 3rd, from Cavendish United Church, and in spite of bad roads was largely attended. Rev. George Gough conducted the service and spoke very feelingly of good mothers. A favorite hymn, "Saved By Grace" was beautifully sung as a duet by Mrs. Lewis Toombs and Olaf Stevenson, assisted by choir in the chorus. Other hymns were "Rock of Ages" and "Nearer My God To Thee."
