Automation In Hospital Field Sparks Fear In Administrator

The administrator of the Victoria General Hospital in Fredericton, B. B. Rupert H. Stocker, in his address to the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Hospital Association, told the delegates "we are overcome with the fear that the frantic efforts to achieve efficiency, there is an over emphasis on specialization."

He also suggested that "we are resting on the brink of mental, moral and physical bankruptcy in this regard." He suggested that automation is helping in this bankruptcy and that it might eventually replace personal touch in the field of nursing care.

Mr. Stocker said that commission reports are forcing hospitals to cut budgets drastically and are pricing professional nurses off the market. Nursing assistants and technicians are contributing factor in this.

OTTAWA (CP)—Agriculture Minister Hays today announced a two-cent subsidy on Canadian cheese. The subsidy is one cent less than last year's and two cents less than in 1962. Mr. Hays said the subsidy has been reduced because the price of cheese in Britain has risen 33 cents a pound from 28 cents in 1961.

P.E.I. Native Appointed as Chief of Shore Patrol

MONCTON — A Prince Edward Islander, who joined Canadian National Railways ferries as a deckhand more than a quarter of a century ago, has been named to the newly created post of chief of the Strait ferry services and dock facilities.

The appointment of Capt. Herbert G. MacKenzie, a native of St. John's, was announced Thursday by Capt. Douglas MacLean, marine superintendent of the CNS ferries.

Capt. MacKenzie, in his new position, will be responsible for the coordination and control of passenger, automobile, railway and truck traffic on the Northumberland Strait service.

He joined CN as a deckhand aboard the "Charlottetown" and CNS "Prince Edward Island" in 1935. During the Second World War he served aboard transport vessels sailing in the Atlantic, Caribbean, Africa and European waters.

Sask. Premier Makes No Move To Quit Post

REGINA (CP)—COP Premier Woodrow Lloyd gave no indication Thursday he was ready to hand over the government of Saskatchewan to the victorious Liberal party.

The victory of the Liberals in the April 22 election, one of the closest in the province's history, was confirmed Wednesday night when the official count of ballots gave them 20 of the 24 seats in the legislature. Confirmed, too, were victories of the Progressive Conservative and the Liberal parties.

There were several constituencies decided by fewer than 100 votes. Premier Lloyd said he wanted to see the official results before deciding on future action. Liberal Leader Ross Thatcher said his party's mandate should not be honored "at the earliest opportunity."
