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## ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

The Changes That Have Been Made  
—Organ Recital Last Night.

For the first time since that memorable Easter Monday morning when the fire fled played such havoc with the interior of St. James' Church and destroyed the fine organ which so often pealed forth in response to the touch of the skill'd organist, this architecturally beautiful structure was last evening thrown open to the public. During the time that the church was closed for repairs many important changes were made therein, and that these changes have all been for the better seemed to be the opinion of the critical audience in attendance last evening.

The arrangement of the seats on the main floor has been changed and new aisles have been opened up. Nearly all the seats are now in semicircular rows, and are more easy of access than they were under the old arrangement. The old pews have been replaced by new ones of ash, and each pew is fitted with book-racks. The organ-gallery and the pulpit in front have also been materially changed, and have been fitted with ornamental panel work and railings. The organ gallery has been lowered to within five feet of the floor, and its area has been increased and other improvements made. A new ceiling similar to that of St. Paul's church has been put in. The ceiling is of clear spruce, and is supported by ornamental corbels of whitewood and birch. The lighting is by electricity, there being three very handsome chandeliers suspended from the ceiling and a number of other lights arranged under the galleries. The arrangement of the lights is very complete, and the delicate effect produced is decidedly pleasing to the artistic eye.

Everything considered the esteemed pastor of St. James' and his good people have reason to be proud of the fine church property they possess, every seat in which will probably be occupied on Sunday next when it will be formally opened for public worship. The skilled hand and artistic touch of Mr. W. C. Harris is everywhere manifest, and under his direction the Messrs Lowe have carried out their contract to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The organ recital of last evening, which was made the occasion of the formal reopening of the church, was, from a musical standpoint, a distinct success. The magnificent new pipe organ under the master touch of Mr Earle seemed almost invested with life, and the eleven numbers opposite his name on the programme were played in a manner that enraptured everyone present and demonstrated the capacity of the instrument. Miss Amy Earle and Mr Charles Earle each contributed a vocal solo, singing in good voice and with much expression. A duet by Miss Amy Earle and Mrs E H Norton was also well rendered. It is to be regretted, however, that owing to the illness of Miss Marion Earle the last vocal number on the programme had to be omitted.

## THE IRISH CATHOLICS IN THE MAJORITY.

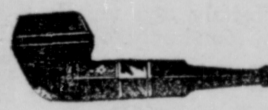
